PENSIONS TRIBUNAL—Fourteen out of the twenty-five veterans who appeared before the Pensions Tribunal in Charlottetown last week had their claims granted and three others were sent to Hospitals for treatment and further consideration. A big proportion of the cases had been rejected previously, some of them three or four times by the Pension Board. Great satisfaction is felt by members of the Canadian Legion by the successful presentation of so many comrades. President J. J. Leightner of the Legion was present at every hearing. His sympathetic attitude and ready desire to be of use in any way possible was commented on by Mr. N. W. Lowther, soldiers' advocate for the Province. Capt. Edwin McKenzie, formerly of Flat River, brother of Dr. David McKenzie, noted Island medic, now of Montreal, was a member of the sitting tribunal. Because of the broadening of the Pension Act returned men have increased opportunities and hope of establishing pensionable disability claims.

SIR ARTHUR ROSTRON A FAMOUS COMMANDEER LONDON, June 24 (By The Canadian Press)—Captain Sir Arthur Rostron, Commodore of the Cunard Line, who retired recently after 36 years' service with the Cunard Steamship Company and 46 years as a sailor, has saved more lives than any other commander afloat. It was he who, as commander of the Carpathia in 1912 steamed at full speed for 60 miles to the aid of the sinking Titanic and rescued more than 700 passengers. He is 62 years of age.

Captain Rostrom's most famous command probably was the Mauretania, to which he was appointed in 1915 and on which he crossed the Atlantic 240 times. He was appointed commodore of the Cunard fleet in July, 1928, and his last command was that of the Berengaria, the third largest liner in the world. Captain Rostrom probably has gained more honors than any other captain in the British mercantile marine, and his decorations include the American Congress gold medal, which together with a silver loving-cup and \$13,000 was presented to him in New York after the Titanic epic. On his last trip to New York in the Mauretania he was given the freedom of the city by Mayor Walker.

In 1918, Captain Rostrom was appointed captain on the active list of the Royal Navy Reserve. From January until May, 1924, when he retired from the active list of the R. N. R., he was also-deputy-captain of the King, and in 1926 was created a knight.

Wall Street Mirror Says:—Special to Johnston & Ward

Montreal, June 24—The advance in the shares of smelters can be attributed to the increase in the price of lead from 3.74 to 4 cents a pound. The importance of any advance in base metal prices, particularly lead and zinc, to Const. Smelters and Mining, can hardly be over emphasized and the current increase in lead would appear to indicate that the trend is now upward. The price of copper has also been increased by 3 cent a pound. An increase of only one quarter of a cent in lead and zinc means \$1,500,000 extra to smelters.

Canada Cement common was in good demand yesterday and the shares firmed up somewhat. It is rumored in the street that the pool which moved the stock up to above 18 last March is again operating in it and higher prices are being talked for the issue.

Now that we have had two pieces of constructive news in a very short space of time, the application of the rails for a pay increase and President Hoover's war debt plan—it would not be surprising to witness more constructive news emanating from Washington. In certain sections of Wall Street there is a belief that something will be said that might help the commodity markets. When the merchant and manufacturer finds that his inventory loss there will be steadily increased in such purchases and consequently stepping up all along the line.

It behooves the speculator for the rise and the investor to keep calm while the markets are endeavouring to find a level of stability and to continue to look for favorable and constructive factors.
