YACHT WITH SEVEN ABOARD DISAPPEARS

RIMOUSKI, Que., Oct. 9.—Careful search up to noon today had failed to fathom the mystery surrounding the disappearance of the yacht Bernadette, which with a party of seven has been missing since Saturday night.

The steamer Lady Evelyn, of the Post Office Department after a two-day search, reported at noon today that no trace of the missing yacht could be found. The Bernadette was commanded by Harold Blair, its proprietor, one of the managers of the Price Brothers firm at Rimouski, and should have reached port early Monday morning. The Bernadette left for the north shore in a friendly race with the yacht Genone commanded by A. Fornier, of Rimouski. The Bernadette was reported to have left Monday morning and reports a very rough passage across. The Bernadette left at the same time.
