### UNITED BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

The interest that characterized the meeting of the Baptist Association on Friday was carried into the meetings of Saturday. The papers read and the addresses given were equal in merit to those of the preceding day and were enthusiastically received. Following the regular devotional service, the secretary read the Digest of Letters. The letters received showed that the Baptists of Prince Edward Island are maintaining the missionary zeal bequeathed them by their denominational ancestors of centuries past. There has been a gratifying increase in numbers by baptism, during the year one missionary has gone to the foreign field and two more are ready to go. Church buildings are being remodelled and enlarged and several new parsonages are being built. The financial aid to the Forward Movement has exceeded the expectations of the most optimistic, several churches having doubled their objective.

Rev. J. W. Neilson gave an address on Foreign missions, dwelling chiefly on the disadvantages under which the Foreign Missionary labored, such as the exposure in unsuitable buildings during the rainy season, financial embarrassment, and the excitable temperament of the natives in many of the foreign lands. The speaker impressed upon his hearers the great need of the earnest appeal for more conscientious stewardship and greater faithfulness in prayer for those who carry the evangel to those who live in heathen darkness.

Mrs. John Dawson of Tryon read a paper on "The Grand Ligne Mission" discussing briefly the objects of this Mission, the needs and the outlook. Grand Ligne has justified her existence in her success in circulating the Bible, in the loyalty of her sons and daughters during the late war, in the splendid type of men and women she has prepared and sent into the world to share the common burden. New churches are being organized in connection with the mission, new building lots have been purchased within the year and one new building erected.

On Saturday afternoon, the Woman's Aid Society held its annual session. On behalf of the Society Mrs. A. A. MacNeill of O'Leary in a brief and delightful address welcomed to "the Island" work the wives of the new ministers—Mrs. Britton, Mrs. Heron and Mrs. MacWalker. Mrs. Heron responded. Two splendid addresses were given at this meeting one by Miss. Mason of Nasapattam, India, and one by Miss Bain of North River, Missionary elect.
