IN MEMORIAM

HON. JOHN E. SINCLAIR

The death of Hon. John E. Sinclair (Senator) occurred in the Prince Edward Island Hospital on December 23rd, 1949.

Although his health had not been good for some time had many realized his serious condition and his passing came as a great shock to his many friends throughout the whole Dominion.

Senator Sinclair was born in Summerfield on December 24th, 1879, son of the late Peter Sinclair and Margaret MacMurdo Sinclair. After completion of his school education he took up farming in his home community which occupation he continued to engage in during the remainder of his life time.

In the year 1908 he commenced his long and honourable political career when he was nominated as a liberal candidate for first Queens but was defeated in the Provincial election held that year.

He was subsequently elected to the House of Commons at Ottawa and represented his constituency there almost continually until 1930 when he was appointed to the Senate.

While in the Commons he served several years as a Minister without Portfolio in the cabinet of Prime Minister Rt. Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King.

During this long period in public life he capably served on many committees at all times courageously and selflessly supporting any legislation which was for the benefit of his constituency and the common good.

In his own community his passing will be felt very keenly being a leader in many of its activities and despite the pressure of work called upon to give of his time and talents to promote any good project or help a neighbor in time of need. In the work of the Masonic Order he gave many years of faithful service and attained some of the highest honours of that organization.

He was a very devoted member of Summerfield United Church serving for a long period as chairman of the board of Stewards and later as an elder and teacher in the Sunday School. His constant work was always present at divine worship contributed generously to the various church projects and during his life time donated several pieces of furniture to his church for its comfort and beautification. The many friends of his country, his christian character will serve as an inspiration to those who knew him, so well described in the lines of the poet.

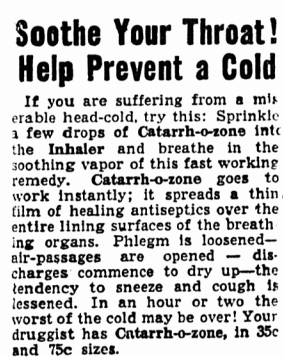

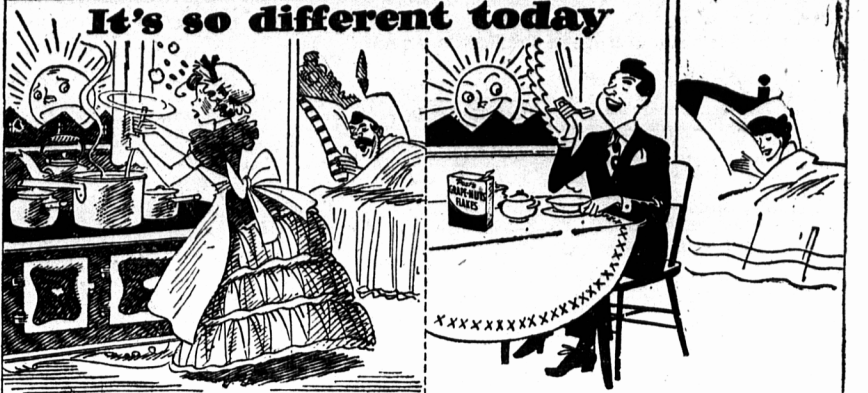
