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Beavers Blanked By Wolverines In Third Session 2-0

Lennon and Cowley Break Clear To Register Counts As Saint John Puts On "Ganging Act".

SAINT JOHN, N. B., Dec. 8.—(G.P.)—After holding the second-place Halifax Wolverines scoreless for two periods, Saint John Beavers remained in the Maritime Hockey League cellar tonight.

With only three minutes to go, and two Halifax players in the penalty box, Beavers swarmed upon the ice determined to score. These tactics, leaving only the goalie in St. John's cage, resulted in the defeat.

Three penalties to the Beavers and four to the Wolverines speeded the play considerably as the squad alternately carrying the heavier man power, drove to tally.

Wilson made a fine double stop during one of those moments. Halifax failing to sink the rebound after a difficult save, Sargent earlier had frustrated McNeill single-handed. Seven men paraded to the pen in this period.

When Porteous board-checked Jemmett and Graham sent the same man to the ice they were waived to the sidelines, signaling the most dangerous attack by Saint John to this stage of the match.

After carrying the fight to the winners through much of the final round in a vain effort to snare a goal or two and break their long slump, Beavers were the victims of their own aggressiveness.

SUCCESSFULLY DEFENDS TITLE

Vince Dundee, Middle-weight Champ, Fights Draw With Stubby Callahan.

BOSTON GARDEN, Boston, Dec. 8.—Vince Dundee, crafty 28-year-old middleweight champion, fought a nicely placed battle tonight to gain a divided decision over his first challenger, Stubby Callahan, and retained the fistic crown he won from Lou Brouillard in the same ring only five weeks ago.

With his staminate Jack Sharkey directing his attack, Callahan rushed the champion against the ropes and into corners, ripped hard rights and harder lefts to the head and body to pile up a lead before retiring in the ninth round.

Dundee calmly ignored Callahan's early success and waited until his smaller and lighter rival shot his bolt. Then he brought all of his sound ring skill into play to sweep every one of the last five rounds which, added to his fifth and sixth sessions, gave him a total of seven. Callahan was credited with six and the third and seventh appeared even.

Referee Jack Dekker of Springfield, and Judge Jim Carrig, Belmont, voted for Dundee and the other official, Eddie McDonald of Brockton, who was inside the ring during the preliminaries, sided with Callahan.

Dundee, weighing 158 1/2, appeared to be following a carefully laid battle plan. He relied upon his physical advantages, a six-pound weight pull and a third of a foot margin in height, as a rock on which Callahan could dash himself into defeat.

And, New England titleholder in three divisions, recalled at the start that an early knockout was his best chance for victory and a world championship, and he wore himself out striving for this ending.

Despite his lead-like arms and feet, Callahan remained the aggressor until the final bell and only Dundee's brilliant work in the final round, when he stood toe-to-toe, slugging it out with his courageous foe, entitled him to the majority vote.

After a change of lines Foster made three brilliant saves from Lawlor, Nicholson and Kelly but a minute later Currie intercepted a pass at his blue line to race to the Moncton barrier where he slipped it to Nicholson. "Hickey" made no mistake and the red light flashed.
