**Eloping Girl Has Repented**

(WILMINGTON, Del., Nov. 17.—Roger L. Totten, educator of Dover, Del., and Miss Margaret Hill, nineteen-year-old school teacher of Seabrook, Del., who eloped from Dover last week have returned to Delaware, saying they "wanted to make good."  
 The pair were arrested at the railroad station here by the police. There is a charge of wife desertion against Totten, and the girl is held "pending investigation."  
 The couple said they had been to Brookline, Mass., where Mrs. E. L. Totten, mother of Roger, resides. Totten was state statistician for Delaware's state board of education until his elopment nine days ago, when he was ousted from office. In a statement to the police, Totten said he and Miss Hill, who fled in Totten's automobile, had been in an accident near Boston, in which Miss Hill was severely bruised. They decided, Totten declared, to return to their homes and "face the music."  
 Totten and Miss Hill were taken before Attorney-General Townsend, where, after a conference, Mr. Townsend announced that Totten would be sent to Dover tonight, under arrest, to face the charge of desertion, and that Miss Hill would be sent to her home.  
 Totten, with Miss Hill arrived at the home of his mother, Mrs. Emma L. Totten of Brookline, Mass., on Wednesday. The couple came by automobile and Miss Hill was suffering from injuries received when their machine was in a collision.  
 The girl was cared for by Mrs. Totten and it is understood, after the matter had been thoroughly talked over, Totten and Miss Hill decided to return to Delaware.
