



 THE LESSER DANGER

The entire crux of play in many deals is the selection of the lesser danger.

South dealer. Neither side vulnerable.

The hand was well split by both North and South, and the final contract was the best that could have been reached. West opened the heart nine. This was ducked in dummy, and when East played the jack, declarer could be the next thing to certain that the heart queen, was also in East's possession. As he explained later, South did place the heart queen with East, but for reasons he failed to make clear, he jumped to the conclusion that the nine was a singleton, and to prevent West from ruffing a heart, South pulled the trumps as quickly as possible, cashing the ace and king. Now he knocked out the diamond ace, but West led another heart through the king, and declarer was helpless. Long before he could discard on dummy's diamonds, West ruffed in with his high trump, and the defenders, then found it easy to collect a heart and a club trick, defeating the contract.

There was no impressive reason for South to fear that the opening lead had been a singleton, but there was reason to guard against another heart lead through dummy's king. The right line of play was to send the trump ten through West, at the second trick. This would simultaneously take care of the possibility that West held Q-J-x-x of trumps, and insure, as far as South could, that East would be put on lead, because South's ten would win, and South would have the time to draw trumps and establish the diamonds without setting up a heart trick for the opponents.

APHIDS

These small, soft-bodied green or red insects are found in clusters on underside of leaves and on stalks of flowers and vegetables. They suck plant juices and cause leaves to curl and die. Uncontrolled, they can do tremendous damage.

TO CONTROL: Spray leaves with "Green Cross" DDT Flower Spray or Dust with "Garden Guard" and repeat weekly. "Ray's" trademark.
