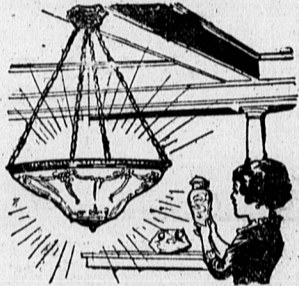

### Explosives Found Near Windsor, Ont.

WINDSOR, Ont., July 10.—A cache containing 250 sticks of dynamite, four canister bombs and one hand bomb was found concealed in a bluff on the Walker estate on the Drouillard road about 200 yards beyond Ford City late Thursday afternoon. The discovery was made by a small boy who took a stick of dynamite to the authorities. Investigation by the Royal Canadian and Ford City police followed.

The contents of the cache were taken possession of by the R. C. M. P., who purpose having an enquiry into the matter. No clue as to the owner or for what use the explosives were intended have as yet been secured.
