In a letter to the Press on the subject of the prevailing smallpox on the mainland, Dr. H. D. The annual meeting of the Dunk River Dairy Co was held in Centreville on Feb. 12th. The report of the secretary showed that 1,765,347 lbs of milk were received during the year amounting in value to \$18,533.98, of which \$12,460.15 was realized for butter. Four settlements were made with the patrons during the year. January to April 3,745 lbs of butter were manufactured and patrons received 73 cts per 100 lbs for their milk. May to August 4,999 lbs of butter and the patrons received 70 cents. During Sept and October 47,338 lbs of cheese were made which netted the patrons \$1.00 per 100 lbs of milk. During November and December 7,825 lbs of butter were made which netted the patrons 93.47 per 100 lbs milk. The financial statement showed a net profit of \$29.35 on the business of the year after providing for current expenses and a dividend of 5 per cent. The following patrons received the largest sums for milk during the season. John Craig, 425.12; Jas. McMurdo, 400.77; Geo. McFarlane, 373.42; Artemus McCaull 355.68; Alex. Henderson, 338.45; Alex. Anderson, 312.22; Chas. Craig, 293.50; D. B. McDonald, 294.01; M. H. McCabe, 274.17; Jas. Carruthers 269.91. The following were appointed directors for the ensuing year: Chas. McFarlane, M. H. McCabe, Louis Trueman, Alex. Cairns, W. A. Ramsay, Artemus McCaull, Nath. Pearson.
