A STIRRING PROTEST.

In a letter to the Toronto News Rev. Dr. Carman, General Superintendent of the Methodist Church, utters a "stirring protest against the attempt to force separate schools upon the new Provinces of the Northwest. Here is a sample passage:

"There are Liberals alive who never expected to see such enormities attempted in the name of Liberalism, and pronounced as the Provincial school policy of a Liberal Government. It is inconceivable that the Liberal leaders, who, during the middle nineties made legislative halls resound, and filled the land with their irresistible arguments and patriotic eloquence against coercion, should, before ten years have passed, strive to re-fate themselves in a timid subservency and arbitrary and usurping legislation. Do they take it all back and crave pardon? Can it be that in the extremity of this measure they are making atonement? Or was it fustian then and fustian now? An old Liberal, looking at what has occurred in Ontario, what is going on in Quebec and what is projected in the Dominion, may well raise the question, Is the Liberal party given over to madness that it may be destroyed? Does it join hands with the coercionists of 1896 against National Schools in our new domain?"

If The Patriot would consult the "good business men" of Charlottetown it would find that they, like The Guardian want the tunnel.

A Constant Reader in a private note to the editor says: "I write only to express my appreciation of your able efforts to promote the interests of the Province in regard to our winter service." Many like expressions reach us daily by letter, by telephone and by verbal messages.

In advocating the tunnel The Guardian has no axe to grind, no private or party ends to serve. Our sole desire is to render the best public service in our power. And the people realize this. They know the public improvements which we have advocated in the past, and which, having been obtained, they value. We need not name them. Thousands of readers have them fresh in their memory.

A valued correspondent whose name would add weight to his words were it published, writes: "I am glad to note that you have so ably taken up the subject of winter communication and shown the losses, hardships, and inconveniences which we suffer during the winter months. The whole community owe you a debt of gratitude for your able advocacy of the matter."

General Nogi could not get into Port Arthur until he resorted to the tunneling process. Miles of tunnels were bored beneath the otherwise impenetrable works and they were blown up with dynamite. Our position is the reverse of his. He wanted a way in; we want a way to get out. This island is besieged and blockaded by ice—more closely blockaded than Port Arthur was. There was never a period of six weeks that some supplies did not enter Port Arthur harbor by ship or vessel during the siege. Here the blockade has been absolute for six weeks. We must have the tunnel!

Mohammed Abdullah, commonly spoken of as the Mad Mullah of Somalia, is again on the war path, after a year of quiet. He first began to make trouble in 1899. Two expeditions were sent against him, under Col. Swayne in 1901 and 1902 neither of which were very successful. Another and stronger force under General Manning in 1903 met with little better success. Then General Egerton was brought from India, and with a still stronger force inflicted a severe defeat, but the Mullah escaped. These expeditions have cost hundreds of lives and \$15,000,000 in money. And this costly and troublesome "little war," is not yet over.

THE WINTER SERVICE MEETING.

Do not forget the Winter Service meeting to be held in the Market Hall Charlottetown on Friday evening next. A preparatory meeting will be held by the delegates with the Charlottetown Board of Trade in the afternoon previous. The matter for deliberation is of the utmost urgency and importance.

Abuse of The Guardian never yet gained popular favor for any public man or newspaper. Nor can such abuse help forward any public improvement.

Forty four days without a steamer to or from the mainland. Isn't it time we had a winter steamer that can move in winter—an ice-breaker that will break ice!

The Patriot, to put it mildly is mistaken. The editorial articles in The Guardian are from one pen. Outsiders do not write Guardian editorials. Can The Patriot say the same of its editorials?

Seldom if ever before has The Guardian had more assurances of popular support and endorsement than its advocacy of the tunnel. The endorsement comes from farmers, merchants, professional and public men. The people are with us.

We cannot get that tunnel in a year, or perhaps in five years to come. But the Dominion Government can easily provide us with a strong, efficient ice-breaking steamer for next winter's service. The urgent question of the moment is will they do this, or will they deliberately leave this Province to suffer another siege like that of this winter?

The Patriot says that "the difficulties and how to overcome them" in regard to the tunnel are "a question for us who are most vitally concerned, to grapple with and master." We do not so understand the situation. It is a question for the Government of Canada, to fulfil its bond, and to place the Island on an equal footing with the other Provinces. The party organ finds its chief employment in suggesting objection, and framing excuses for official inaction.
