R. A. Donahoe, Abegweits, Distinguishes Himself.

Winning the All Round Medal in the Collegiate Sports—Wins Praise from All.

In the annual field sports of McGill University Friday, R. A. Donahoe, the well known Abegweit athlete made a name for himself and was chief in winning the trophy for his year. Mr. Donahoe secured twenty two of the forty five points in his year thus winning the medal for the best all round athlete. His record was second in 120 yds hurdles, first in broad jump, first in pole vault, second in 220 yds run, second in 16 lb shot and second in 440 yds run. On every side are heard words of praise for the Irishman from the east, as he was popularly dubbed. He will make a strong addition to the University track club.

Herbert Bell who was spending a week in Montreal among his old college chums sailed for England Saturday to pursue his studies in Edinburgh University. Mr. Bell went west last spring and spent the summer on the prairies. He was enthusiastic in his praise for the treatment he has been receiving at the hands of the Scotch people. He graduates in two years in the M. A., B. Sc. course.

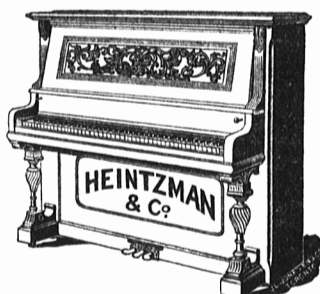
