Police Dept. Appeals To Motorists

Urging motorists to drive carefully and not harm children, the Police Department issued a general appeal along the safety lines yesterday.

"This is the annual play period for children," it is explained, "and it's a lot of the year when streets are busy with motor traffic. Youngsters are always doing the unexpected, and the Dept. asks motor car drivers to exercise extra care those days, and drive carefully whenever any children are about."

"Parents, too, ought to instruct boys and girls to follow the 'lines', across the streets carefully and avoid taking any chances. This is a duty that every parent should carry out. Otherwise, a warning will save a young life."

Special Meeting Ch'town Branch Canadian Legion

A special meeting of the Charlottetown branch of the Canadian Legion was held in their Rooms last evening, and despite the humidity of the weather a fairly large gathering attended.

The chairman, Mr. McNutt, in his opening remarks dwelt at some length on the various activities and other work in connection with the convention. He paid special tribute to the Island delegates, whom he said, behaved in a splendid manner throughout the convention.

Before receiving the reports from the different delegates, it was unanimously decided by the meeting that only a short synopsis be given to be followed by a more detailed report at meeting some time in the fall, the date of which to be advertised later.

The chairman, Mr. McNutt, in his opening remarks dwelt at some length on the various activities and other work in connection with the convention. He paid special tribute to the Island delegates, whom he said, behaved in a splendid manner throughout the convention.

Speaking generally, the chairman said that few realized the extensiveness of the Canadian Legion. This organization has now 678 branches in Canada, 314 being organized since January last, with a total membership of 40,000, and still adding to its members.

The efforts of the Legion this coming year will be mainly directed in the assistance of disabilities who are unable to earn a living, and it is especially urged upon the Federal Government to face with a view to obtaining added assistance relative to same.

He made reference to the "Legionary", a magazine published in Toronto and devoted to returned soldiers, etc., and regretted the fact, in regard to the circulation, that 34,000, only 12,000 members are subscribers. Particular attention was also called to the large deficit of \$23,000 against the paper, but hoped that in the course of time this liability would be attended to.

The Chairman then called on Dr. Johnson, Honorary President of the Legion, and a member of the Canadian Government, the Hon. Colonel Johnson gave a very interesting talk on the many duties of the convention and a brief summary of the doings of the Council.

He said there were over 150 resolutions before the Council and incidentally mentioned that the Council had its work out. One important resolution which was passed was that with regard to the immigration of young boys into Canada. It was considered that boys from fourteen to sixteen years of age were undesirable as immigrants in so far that they do not know their minds as to occupation and various other reasons. He said that the Dept. of Immigration were in accord along those lines. From seventeen to twenty-one was considered a more desirable age, and that the Dept. of Immigration were in accord along those lines.

Comrade Phillip Palmer, a member of the Resolutions Committee and Comrade Arthur Bruce of the Resolutions Committee, gave a very interesting and comprehensive report of their different activities while in Saint John. Both gentlemen were very eulogistic over the treatment accorded the delegates while there. They could not say enough with respect to the hospitality and kindness shown them on all sides. To use their own words, "they wouldn't miss the trip for a farm."

The meeting closed with the singing of God Save the King.

(Continued from page 1) the lane between MacKenzie's and Lamont's farm. There he saw fresh car tracks, which followed right down the lane till they came to a gap in the fence. Here they lead into a grain field, where they stopped. Here there were fresh tracks in the grain leading from where the car was parked going in the direction of his ranch. Witness then went back and got breakfast. He then called up Herbert Moase, Constable, at Kensington. Witness and Moase then went down to the lane again and were able to trace the tracks of the three men between the place where the car was parked and the ranch—a distance of three quarters of a mile. Then they had their dinner.

As to the car tracks, witness noticed that the left front wheel had on it a tire with a "T" tread. This was quite plain. The other three seemed to be pretty smooth.

As to the tracks made by the men one was a large track, another was made by rubber boots, and the third was a medium track.

Then Constable Biggar and J. C. Sims witness brother arrived from Charlottetown. All had dinner, and once more examined the tracks. Then they went to Iriestown to look for Binns and later to John Lea's ranch, where they met the accused, Mallet. They got out of the car, and Moase and Biggar conversed with Mallet. Witness stood aside from them, and did not hear the conversation. Biggar and the prisoner then got into witness's car and drove away.
