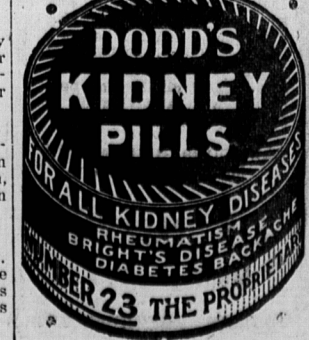
—The very many friends of Mr. J. LeRoy Holman of Summerside will be sorry to learn that he is confined to his bed for a few days on account of illness.
