FRENCH APPROVE OF U.S. SHIPS

(Canadian Press Despatch.) PARIS.—A correspondent of the Journal describes a visit aboard the first American ships of the new type which arrived recently at a French port. He says the steamer, which he calls J., belongs to the class of vessels which accompany the squadron far from its base and are capable of keeping it constantly supplied with food, coal and material for repairs. The J. did not come alone, but was accompanied by one of the new boats constructed for pursuit of submarines.

HOG BUYING

Owing to the fact that receipts of hogs are now too limited for regular packing operations, Messrs. Davis & Fraser have notified their buyers throughout the province that no shipments can be received here for this season after Wednesday, June 13th inst. This means that hogs should be delivered to shippers at country points not later than Tuesday morning, 12th inst.

Any farmer whose hogs are not in proper condition for killing at present would hardly make any mistake in holding them for early September market, when this firm recommences packing as usual. The outlook is for good prices then, and as it has always been a handicap to this local industry that sufficient supplies of hogs are not available at the beginning of the season, meaning the loss of trade, it would be a matter of mutual benefit if farmers would cooperate and have them ready early in September. They would thus assure themselves of highest prices and at the same time provide Davis & Fraser with material to compete for business which otherwise goes to firms—and incidentally benefits farmers—in the western provinces or elsewhere. This certainly seems to be an instance where Island farmers have it well within their power to "encourage Home Industry" and at the same time reap special advantages for themselves—by having hogs ready for early September market. 955-6-12M21.

\$150,000 FIRE IN PHILADELPHIA

PHILADELPHIA—Fire early today destroyed the garage, stable and warehouse of Gimlet Brothers at 21st and Market Streets, causing a loss estimated at \$150,000. Fifty automobile trucks were consumed in the blaze. The property of the company occupying the remainder of the block where the fire occurred today was destroyed by fire last February, causing a loss of three quarters of a million dollars.
