NEW YORK, Jan. 22—(AP)—Low Burston, the linguistic expert of the fight managers, was wondering today in every one of the eight languages in his repertoire. He is going right down the vocabulary in every language concerning Wednesday night's fight in Madison Square Garden in which Henry Armstrong defends his world welterweight championship against the challenge of Pedro Montanez.

"How," he wondered in English today, "can these odds layers make Henry a 1-10-3 favorite over my boy Pedro?"

"Lew can't see how 'my boy Pedro' can miss. The betting men can."

"All you hear around town," Lew went on, "is how Armstrong is going to chase Pedro right out of the Garden, and up 49th Street past Jacobs' Beach. They say my boy has a little 'kyoode' in him. Scoring Aces Face Each Other Tonight

The National Hockey League's "first division" teams go back into action again tonight with the leading New York Rangers meeting their intra-city rivals the Americans in one game and the second and third place Boston Bruins and Toronto Maple Leafs clashing in the other at Boston.

A loss for the Maple Leafs, who have fallen off slightly since their great comeback, will be costly to them for they now are three points behind the Bruins and five back of Rangers.

Apps' return, likely in about a week's time, is expected to bring the Leafs back to their early form again, but in the meantime any points they can pick up, especially against teams like Boston and Rangers, will be helpful.

Bruins too need the victory for Rangers are not expected to have too much trouble with Americans. By losing to the Rangers Sunday night Boston also lost their share of the league leadership and another loss, coupled with a Ranger victory would put them four points off the pace.

A highlight of the Boston game—if any is needed when these two clubs meet—will be the duel between Gordon Drillon of the Leafs and Milt Schmidt of Boston. The league's official scoring statistics showed last night that these two aces share the lead so tonight's game should see an individual as well as a team battle.

Americans, who climbed out of the cellar Sunday night for the first time this season, can jump over Detroit Red Wings into fifth place by winning and can be expected to give Rangers a keen fight all the way.

The Patrickmen, however, look too good for Red Dutton's veteran Amerks.

Drillon Seven Points Ahead Of Cowley

MONTREAL, Jan. 22—(CP)—Gordie Drillon came back to the National Hockey League was last week, just in time to add a little to his lead over other Maritimers now in the N. H. L. All-in-all, it was the quietest week in a scoring way, the eight Maritime stars have had since the season started.

The Montreal ace picked up two assists in two games, to swell his total to 27 points on 15 goals and 12 assists.

CHICAGO, Jan. 22—(AP)—The Illinois Athletic Commission closed its hearing today on published charges by heavyweight boxer Harry Thomas that he had participated in "fake" fights with Max Schmeling and Tony Galento, and announced a decision would be given Jan. 29.

The Chicago Tribune published Thomas' charges that he lost to Schmeling at New York Dec. 13, 1937, and to Galento at Philadelphia Dec. 14, 1938, by previous arrangement.

Pan-American Games Certainty

NEW ORLEANS, Jan. 22—(AP)—The President of the National Amateur Athletic Union, Lorenzo di Benedetto, declared today the Pan-American games are "a certainty" for this year and might become a permanent series for western hemisphere nations.

"This would certainly solidify relations of the Americas," he said. "Of course it calls for time and first we must get a full organization set up to start the 1940 games."

Canada's Sports Little Affected By War's Alarms

TORONTO, Jan. 20—(CP)—Canada's sports program has gone ahead almost undisturbed by the war, though scores of athletes have enlisted with the fighting forces and others are awaiting the call to colors.

Canadian rugby football play-downs were staged before thousands, while the National Hockey League and the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association have swung into successful seasons. Most sports organizations have expressed the desire to provide relaxation in time of mental strain.

Whether the same condition will apply in another year is a different matter. For the moment, only a part of the country's athletes have been needed in the war effort.

Sports leaders have been quick to enter training for the time when they will be called up and organizations like the Amateur Athletic Union of Canada and the Sports Service League have devoted time and money to aiding sports among the soldiers. The C. A. H. A. has set aside \$5,000 to foster military sports and some military units have entered teams in the C.A.H.A. C. Ross (Sandy) Semoville, six times Canadian amateur golf champion and once United States amateur champion, was among the first to join up and is a lieutenant with the Canadian Active Service Force in England. Robert (Scotty) Rankine, the country's foremost distance runner, joined the Perth Regiment (Machine Gun) at Stratford, Ont.

HOCKEY AS USUAL

Toronto Maple Leafs managed to gain a lead in the first weeks of the National Hockey League schedule, despite the fact every member of the club was taking machine gun drill. The Leafs and Montreal Canadiens cross the border to play United States teams as easily as ever. Every member of the McGill University football team and most members of other college teams entering the Canadian Officers' Training Corps.

It is the Dominion government's expressed wish that civilian activity should follow normal lines as closely as possible, and sports leaders have fallen in with that idea. There is no need in Canada, either, for such a ban as that placed on big sports gatherings in England, where air raids are feared.

To scores of athletes who had hoped for chances to compete in the 1940 Olympic Games the war has brought disappointment. The winter Olympics were to have been held in Germany and the summer games at Helsinki.

Abandonment of the Olympics may mean a slackening of interest in track and field sports next summer, for the prospect of an Olympic team position has given many a goal to work for in the past four years.

Despite the war, preliminary plans have been laid to hold the British Empire Games at Montreal in 1942.

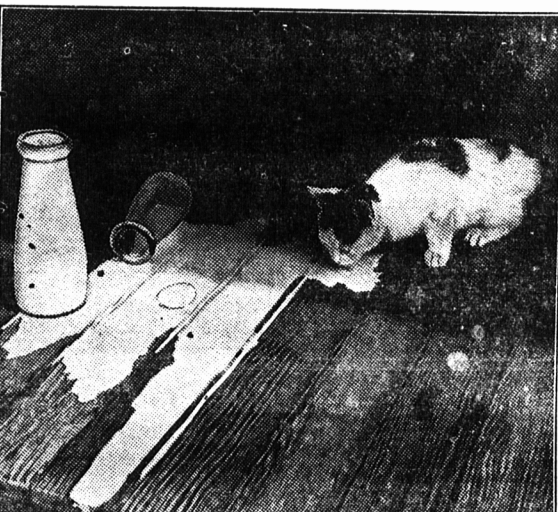

A "created" picture—the photographer spilled the milk, and the kitten did the rest. Develop natural situations to get more interesting shots.

It's fun to look for picture opportunities—but it's more fun to create them. And many of the finest picture chances are created deliberately by the photographer.

If you wait for things to arrange themselves for a picture, you're just trusting to luck, and you may have a long wait. But if you take a few steps to create a situation, you'll find it easier to get just the picture you want—when you want it.

For example, look at the picture above. Is there any point in waiting for such a situation to occur naturally? Not a bit. It's much simpler to spill the milk right where you wish—and shoot. A kitten knows what to do when he's face to face with milk.

There are many such occasions where a little arrangement is a big help. Use a bait to tempt a pet to the best spot for a picture. Give the baby an amusing toy—or place an automatic music-box beside him—and he'll pose, completely unaware of the camera. Provide some action for an older child to carry out—a doll to dress, a book to read, a model boat to work on. The action provides a theme or story which improves the picture.

In shooting outdoor scenes or landscape pictures, try having a friend stand in the foreground, looking at the scene you plan to picture.
