cent is the chairman of the commission. Other men of note in the party are Sir Alfred Bateman, for 40 years a member of the British Board of Trade; Sir Rider Haggard, the well known author and authority of agricultural questions; and Sir Joseph Ward, former premier of New Zealand.

NEWS FORECAST FOR THE COMING WEEK.
 WASHINGTON, D. C., May 31.—The Home Rule for Ireland bill will be brought up in the House of Commons for the second time next Tuesday.

Arguments in the so-called tap line case, which has attracted country-wide attention, will be presented to the Commerce Court in Washington Tuesday. The question at issue is whether fifty-seven tap lines located in various States are common carriers and entitled to participate in joint rates.

Two municipal elections of wide interest will take place early in the week, Portland, Ore., will hold its first election under the commission plan of government. In Los Angeles where a mayor and other city officials are to be chosen, a hard fight for control is on between the Socialist and anti-Socialists.

The trial matches between the American tennis players and the Australian team for the Dwight F. Davis International Challenge Cup are scheduled to begin Friday. The matches are to be held at the West Side Tennis Club in New York city.

Events of the week abroad will include the customary observances of the birthday anniversaries of Pope Pius X. and King George V., the running of the Epsom Derby, the British women's golf championship the opening of a Maritime Exposition at Amsterdam, and the Franco-American celebration commemorating the origin of the name "America" at St. Die.

Conventions and conferences of the week will include the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, at Toronto; the annual meeting of the Canadian Press Association, also to be held in Toronto; the Western Governors' Congress, at Salt Lake City; the General Synod of the reformed church in America, at Asbury Park, and the annual convention of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers and Firemen, at Washington, D. C.

Exercises in honor of the birthday of Jefferson Davis, only President of the South, will be held Tuesday throughout the South.

NEW INSURANCE METHODS.
 SAN FRANCISCO, May 31.—The Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen, in convention here, has approved changes in the organization's insurance methods. All policies hereafter will be paid in full when the holders reach the age of 70. Proposals to adopt a form of paid-up insurance, such as that offered by regular companies, and also to make the loss of one eye total disability, was defeated. A new policy for \$200, available after August 1, was agreed to and the two lower grades of policies now in effect were raised \$50 and \$100 respectively. The increases will be added August 1st.

A NEW PORT OF CALL.
 LONDON, May 31.—Entering the competition for Canadian traffic from Liverpool the Cunard Company have made a new port of call. Yesterday the Franconia left Liverpool for Boston, but she will put in first at Portland, Maine, and there discharge 1,000 passengers she has for Canada.
