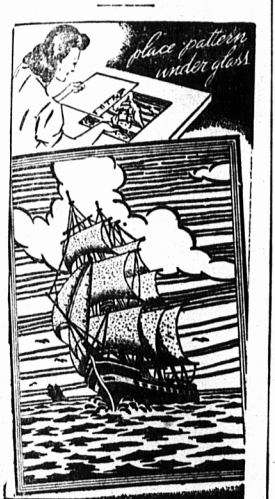

VOLUNTARY WORKERS NEEDED.—Mr. W. P. This office will be open all day and 9 p.m. Voluntary workers are needed at once and at present six stenographers are asked to volunteer their services, and a man of good handwriting machines is respectfully requested.

BOYS GIVEN OUTING.—More than 200 underprivileged boys from this city were given an outing to the north shore by the Kinsmen club on Wednesday. The names of the boys were secured from all the city clergymen. They were taken to Dalvey Beach where they enjoyed sports, swimming and were served refreshments. Transportation was provided by Ralph Jenkins' Transfer. The outing was organized by the Kinsmen Club personal service work.

PAY FOR REGISTRARS.—Organization is being completed for next month's national registration of all Canadian residents of 16 years or over. Mr. Jules Castonguay, chief electoral officer for Canada who has been named chief registrar for national registration, has sent out his instructions and has also intimated that registrars in the various electoral districts will receive \$8 a day for every day employed and assistants \$5 a day. Deputy registrars will receive \$3 a day for each day of registration. Others engaged in the work will be asked to do so voluntarily. Premiums used also will be sought on a 5c unitary basis. In polling divisions where it is expected there will be more than 100 registrations, two deputy registrars should be appointed. Mr. Castonguay said. In selecting accommodations he suggested many persons would desire that only registration officials be in hearing distance when questions are answered, and he called on the registrars to see that such proper accommodation is provided.

Red Cross Notes

In view of the fact that Mrs. J. H. MacCall, chairman of the Red Cross Women's Work Wood committee in Prince Edward Island has just received a communication from Mrs. W. R. Campbell, National Chairman, excepting the following: It has been decided that for the next few weeks the work-room at Red Cross headquarters in Charlottetown will be open on Tuesday and Friday afternoons only when some cutting will be done, knitting material given out and finished articles received. Mrs. Campbell's letter reads in part as follows:

"The urgent appeal for supplies issued on May 23, has been met. Our warehouses in England are replenished with tremendous quantities of supplies, and more are en route. We have only to plan for assistance to Great Britain, since nothing can be sent into Europe at the moment, and for our responsibilities to our own troops here and abroad.

"Every division and branch has been working at top speed for the past two months. There are long months ahead, when all one's energies must be taxed to the utmost. It seems to your committee that this is the opportune time to slow down, so that many things, long delayed, can be accomplished, and that the work of the Red Cross can be carried on in preparation for the autumn.

"There should be no slowing down in knitted comforts. The following articles are in the greatest quantities: All types of caps and helmets, gloves, mitts, sea boot stockings and all the needs of the sailor in the city yesterday. He is sure to fill every jar and bottle in your cupboards with jams and preserves. Help conserve our fruits and vegetables in our own homes and communities. This is a patriotic duty to be observed by all women."

SUCCESSFUL FESTIVAL.—A very successful and enjoyable ice cream and strawberry festival was held last evening on the grounds of the City Hospital. The League of the Cross Band was in attendance and dispensed lovely music to the large and appreciative number of citizens who gathered. The festival was held under the auspices of the Charlottetown sub-division of the Catholic Women's League, and the proceeds will be given to their "Win the War" Campaign.

EXAMINED KNIFE.—The silver plated table knife which was recovered by police, was examined yesterday at the Provincial Laboratory for traces of bloodstains. No stains were found. The knife, which was sharpened to a point, would cut through an inch in width. Dr. McGuigan, who performed an autopsy on the body of Isidore Doucette, who was dead Sunday morning, after being stabbed through the heart, stated the instrument inflicting the fatal wound would be about one point, with a blade one and a half inches in length. The knife was recovered in the weapon used. They were unable to get a satisfactory explanation of the exact time and place it was found. Some children claimed a little girl found it, while others said it was passed on to the girl by a young boy.

EXCELLENT "HAY" WEATHER.—Prince Edward Island continues to have what farmers described as "excellent hay weather." This week the temperature has hovered in the high seventies, moving up to 82 yesterday, which a breeze helped to drive away. Until this week the month had been usually wet, leading to fears there would be difficulty in properly curing the hay. The weather has been an unusually good one. Mr. Warren A. Burns, weather observer at the Charlottetown Experimental Station, gave comparison with previous years. More rain had fallen in July this year, he declared, than had fallen during the whole of the same month in any year since at least 1936. The figures prior to those for 1936 were not immediately available, he said. This month to date 1.96 inches of rain had fallen, he said. The next nearest figure for the whole month was in 1938 when 1.28 inches were recorded. The low month was in 1937 with 0.56 inches.

Churchill Against Plan For Evacuation

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He made the statement in answer to a question about the postponed plan for evacuating troops from Britain to the dominions and the United States.

Mr. Churchill promised that whatever offers of homes overseas are eventually accepted will be shared fairly by rich and poor. But he said frankly that the government did not realize what it was getting into when it accepted the original exodus plan. Lack of naval convoys caused that plan to be given up. The House of Commons today heard that Mr. Churchill said many wealthy children were the first to reach Canada and the United States.

"I take full responsibility for the steps originally taken, and I ask for the indulgence of the House on account of the many difficulties through which we have been passing," he said.

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Liberal M. P. Protests Employment Of Dollar-a-year Men

OTTAWA, July 18.—(CP)—A warning to the government to watch carefully the activities of "dollar-a-year men" and a forecast that Canadian oil refineries would be in a position to dictate policies and prices to the smaller companies which heretofore have imported their oil, were made today by Liberal M. P. Hoblitzel.

"I am informed they have already prepared to do so," Mr. Hoblitzel said. "They have drafted regulations which they are going to submit and will adopt and have put a dollar-a-year man here to watch their interests." (George R. Cottrill is oil minister in the Department of Munitions and Supply.)

"If a labourer is worth anything, he is worth his hire," Mr. Hoblitzel said in what he termed a "stinging" attack on the oil control plan. "I am taking men into the administration without salary. Some organization paid the salaries of some officials and they should be getting their money back. I am not going to pay men placed in key positions rather than to have them remain on the payroll of large industrial concerns."

When it appeared Mr. Hoblitzel's remarks were going to attract without notice by any Government spokesman, Conservative Leader Hanson said the "Toronto member's remarks were a bit of a surprise, considering he had attacked 'patrolmen' serving the Government without pay."

Finance Minister Ilsley, leading the House at the time, said Mr. Hoblitzel's remarks were "a serious attack upon the oil control of the Department of Munitions and Supplies."

Hon. C. D. Howe, Minister of Munitions and Supply, was not in the Chamber but his Government spokesman said he was sure if Mr. Howe were present, "he would have something to say."

While the government had employed a large number of men drawn from industry in Canada, and while it had been necessary in the natural course of events that orders had been placed with companies with which these men had been associated, Mr. Ilsley said. "I have never heard it suggested that orders were placed with one of these men here serving the government has sacrificed the interests of his country for the benefit of the industry to which he had previously been connected."

Vatican Paper Voices Praise For Petain

VATICAN CITY, July 18.—(AP)—Praise in the Vatican newspaper L'Osservatore Romano recently for "good Marshal" Philippe Petain, chief of the new French state, is considered by diplomats here as showing a more favorable attitude toward totalitarian regimes.

Vatican authorities declined to comment on the newspaper's observations, which included a statement that "the principle of authority" is higher than "the human will" which is "intolerant of restrictions and has attempted to overstep all limits, first with criticism and then with revolution."

Foreign circles considered this passage a reference to social-political questions. (German foreign office circles expressed marked satisfaction today over what they regarded as a complete about-face by the Vatican in its position toward totalitarian states.)

L'Osservatore Romano compared one aim of dictatorship with that of the church on a set of principles enunciated by President Antonio Salazar of Portugal, a Catholic. "Salazar, the newspaper said, 'sees the authoritarian regime turned to the purpose' of creating 'a civic conscience which opens and prepares the way for spreading and strengthening the moral conscience.'"

That also "is the desire, aspiration and program of the church," L'Osservatore stated. Turning to the totalitarian movement in France, L'Osservatore Romano said that "the foremost political problem of any people which does not want to die is to cultivate a spirit which 'will be able to impose the supremacy of the common good over private interests of individuals, groups and parties.'"

Praising Petain as "the good Marshal," L'Osservatore Romano said "it is from this old octogenarian that 20-year-olds are asking the renovation of their country."

France's "spiritual regeneration," the newspaper added would be the dawn of "a new, radiant day, not only for France but for all Europe and the world."

Meighen Directs Fire Against U. S. Magazines

OTTAWA, July 18.—(CP)—Conservative Leader Meighen in the Senate today directed his fire at the circulation in Canada of American magazines which militate against the war efforts of this Dominion, and said he "could not impress upon the government with sufficient earnestness the imperative need of action now."

Senator Meighen, as he has done previously, named the Saturday Evening Post and the Chicago Tribune. Government Leader Dandurand in replying, said when Mr. Meighen brought these matters to the notice of the Chamber last month it had been stated in reply that a political situation had arisen wherein it would be necessary to consider the effect banning of these papers would have in certain circles in both countries.

However Senator Dandurand was sure that when the government was apprised of the situation, it would not hesitate to take drastic action.
