RECLAIMING INDIA.

The price paid for the Christianizing process now at work in the world, compared with the results attained, is a fertile subject of adverse comment on the part of those who would figure as opponents of Christianity.

Perhaps no other field in the world has engaged as much attention and elicited as much unfavorable comment in this respect as India. A recent visitor to that land of mystery, Dr. R. F. Horton of England, has thrown a good deal of light on the subject which is well worth making a note of.

The Anglicizing of India is a much larger task and beset with much greater difficulties than many think. A population of 315 millions, of different races, and languages, with an old and established system of education, an ancient religion which has become the life's blood of the country—culture and cast and ancient traditions that are ingrained in the lives of the people, constitute a problem which England faced when she undertook to establish trade in India. It has been said that the task of Anglicizing, such a people is hopeless. Dr. Horton thinks differently.

No one, he says, can say that the task has been accomplished faultlessly, or even from crimes. But it is being accomplished in a way which improves as it goes on. Herculean as the work is to bring order, prosperity, health and progress into such a vast population, that work proceeds silently and surely by the steady persistence and skill of our people.

Through the English government, through the English language,

through the English literature and through the English religion, says Dr. Horton, India, which was a geographical expression, is becoming a nation. The accepted language is English, Bengali and Tamil and all the 170 languages of the great peninsula inevitably give way to English when the scattered races and tongues wish to come together and to confer. Even Hindu colleges are obliged to give their teaching in English. An educated man or woman in India is one who speaks English.

India is becoming Anglicized and Christianized, gradually, slowly, persistently. The conversion is not so much of individuals as of the whole population, their style of living, their moral and social ideals, their capacity for progress. Hinduism itself is undergoing a transformation. It is reverting to all that is noble and great in its ancient religious literature. The determining factor in selection from that vast mass of sacred books is evidently the presence of Christianity and the recognition of a Christian standard.

"There are," says Dr. Horton, "many societies in India today of which the obvious purpose is to assimilate the moral teaching and catch the spiritual atmosphere of Christianity without accepting its dogmatic facts."

In this way the country is gradually becoming permeated with the best teachings of the English people, and the thoughtful subjects of the Maharaja of Mysore are beginning to acknowledge as well as to realize that they owe an untold debt to Great Britain.

of Hay-Pauncefote Panama treaty," and under the cartoon the suggestive title "Wipe out the Stain."

The cartoon, which expresses President Taft's somewhat belated willingness to submit the Panama dispute to arbitration, is a suggestive one. The leading newspapers of the United States press, and doubtless its best people, unhesitatingly pronounce the transaction a "stain" and hail with undisguised approval the proposed settlement by arbitration. The hope is held out that a settlement may even be reached without the formality of arbitration.

It will be remembered that the whole drift of Sir Edward Grey's note of protest was a request for arbitration and the declaration of President Taft that he is ready and willing to arbitrate has met with instant response both in England and the United States.

An encouraging feature of the whole discussion on this question is the evidently friendly relations between the two nations interested, and the frank admission on the part of representative newspapers in the United States that the proposed repudiation of the treaty was a grave wrong for which there was no excuse.

The New York Evening Post, commenting on the proposed submission to arbitration suggests the immediate repeal, by Congress, of the offending clause in the bill as "the shortest way out." "Why should not this be done," asks the Post. "The time seems favorable for such a measure. Several influential congressmen are convinced that the legislation was a blunder from the start. It was merely a pampering of an already pampered monopoly. Moreover, for a petty cause, it has embroiled us with the nation that is most friendly to us in all the world and that is our best customer. What better course than frankly to admit the error in the framing of the law and to save a lot of time and trouble by taking it out?"

The Post says, further, that there is no evidence that there are any really thorough-going champions of the exemption clause outside of those pecuniarily interested.

It is hoped that this regrettable tangle between the friendly nations will be straightened out by diplomatic negotiations without the necessity even of arbitration.

SOME PERTINENT QUESTIONS

Sir—What is keeping the Earl Grey from this port? The Captain's former excuse, inexperience of firemen, will not hold water now. Indeed it leaked a good deal of water a week ago when it was learned that the firemen who were too inexperienced to bring the Grey to Charlottetown ten were old hands.

Is the need of a pilot who knows Charlottetown harbor? If so why does not the Government procure one? Is it that the harbor is not well enough lighted or buoyed? If so it is up to the Marine Department to rise and explain.

Is the Earl Grey not in a fit shape for ice-fighting? There is a whisper in the air that this is the reason and that it is not considered safe to drive her in ice. If this is so it is not best that the people should know it? If the ship is in any way unworthy this is the time to let the fact be known, not after it has been proved by a disaster?

Is it because our federal representatives have no influence at Ottawa? Prince and King's counties, represented by opposition men have all they can ask for and more than they ever expected, while we, with two Conservative members in full bloom can't get the Earl Grey to come into our harbor although the ice conditions are known to be at least as favorable as in Summerside. If this is the reason, our representatives should either find out where their influence has gone or hand in their passports.

There may be some legitimate reason why the Grey has been taken off this route. If there is, in the name of all that is good and righteous, let the people know it and stop the guessing and surmising.

THE MINUTES OF PRESBYTERY.

(From Yesterday's Evening Guardian) The Presbytery of P. E. Island met in St. James' Hall, Charlottetown on Tuesday, 7th, 1913 at 1 p. m. pursuant to adjournment and was constituted by Mr. John Gillis, Moderator pro tempore besides whom were present Messrs J. H. McHattie, D. McLean, A. Craise, ministers, T. C. James, and Lieut. Gov. Rogers, elders, Mr. T. C. James, for T. F. Fullerton, reported that the latter moderator in a call at Brookfield on December 16th last that the call came out unanimously in favor of Mr. J. H. McHattie, Montrose, that it was signed by 125 communicants and 124 adherents, and that it was accompanied with a guarantee of \$900. stipend with use of Manse and glebe. The action of the interim moderator was sustained. The clerk stated that he had cited the congregation of Montrose, etc, to appear for their interests at this meeting; and this action was approved.

Mr. Ramsay Hardy represented Montrose and spoke of Mr. McHattie's good and faithful work and the earnest desire of the people that he should remain among them. Resolutions passed at meetings in other sections of the congregation, also commendatory, of Mr. McHattie's work were received and read.

Mr. Hugh McMillan commissioner from the congregation calling, testified to the heartiness of the people in their desire to secure Mr. McHattie. 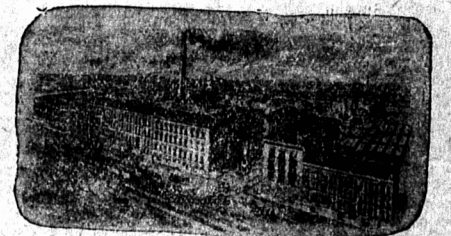
