PARKING REGULATIONS - As there has been some doubt in the minds of many motorists with reference to the parking regulations in the Town of Summerside, the following sections of the Traffic By-Law are quoted namely: 406. For the purpose of keeping order and preventing any obstruction of traffic, the police of the Town of Summerside shall have authority and it shall be their duty to direct and regulate traffic at street intersections and at other frequented portions of streets on all occasions in accordance with this By-Law. 407. The driver of a vehicle shall habitually keep as near as possible to the curb or side of a street on his right hand side and if stopping or parking a vehicle he shall do so near the curb.

Aerial Lobster Patrol Maintained - The aerial watch for lobster poaching is being continued. On Friday, working in conjunction with boats on the surface, a fisheries inspector in a plane spotted lobster traps in the Alberton-Tizic area which, when brought to the surface, numbered 360. This in spite of the intensive search that has been conducted during the past three weeks would indicate that the poachers are not easily discouraged. These traps had been set less than twenty-four hours earlier as indicated by the manner in which they were weighed down. All the traps found were destroyed and their contents returned to the sea. This brings the number of traps seized in this area to approximately two thousand and which should indicate the extent of the poaching that was being carried on.

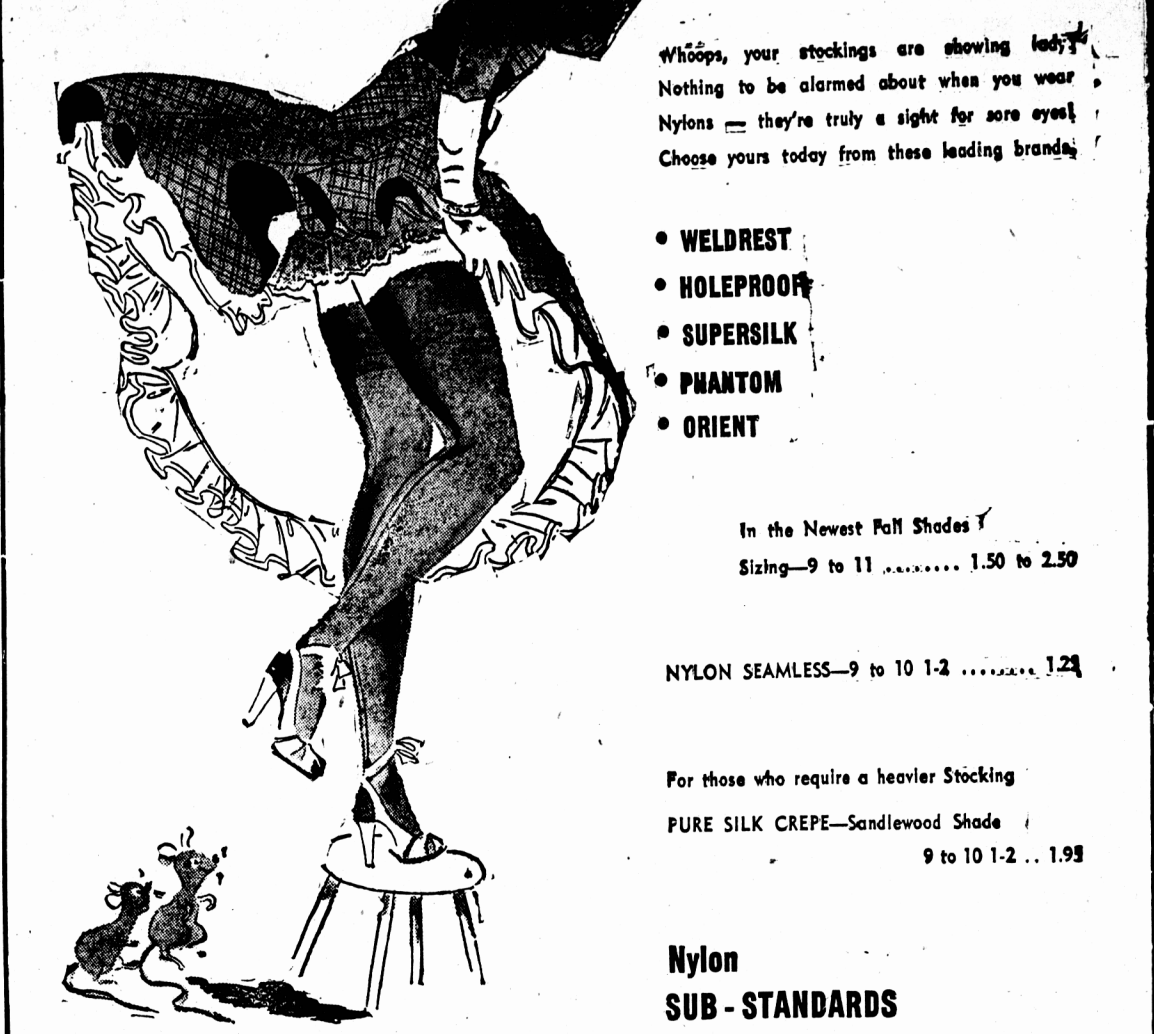
NOVA SCOTIA DOCKERS EARN MORE, GET LESS

HALIFAX, Aug. 28 - (CP) - Although their basic wage was up 10 per cent, Halifax longshoremen earned less for the period were 16 per cent lower than those of the same period of the previous year - a drop of \$298,967.
