GERMANY'S NAVAL LOSSES ADDED TO.

LONDON, Feb. 8.—The Chronicle today prints the following dispatch from a correspondent near the German frontier: "I learn that besides the published German naval losses there are eight destroyers and two submarines written off in the official lists. Two of the destroyers were lost in the Channel on September 4th, three on the Dogger Bank and one on the S-190 in Asiatic waters. One of the submarines sank off Westende and one near the Dogger Bank and another, the S-190 in been missing for over three weeks. The armed auxiliary cruiser Kronprinzessin Cecilie has also been scratched from the official list. The statement made by the German bluejackets captured after the Heligoland naval battle of January 24 that the light cruiser Kolberg sank is confirmed, though not publicly admitted in German naval circles."

ISLAND PASTOR INSTALLED AT OAKLAND

The Middleton D. Journal of Jan. 16th has the following reference to Rev. J. M. Murchison, son of Captain and Mrs. Murchison of this city. The new Oakland Presbyterian Church was fairly launched upon its career Friday night when the newly elected pastor, Rev. J. M. Murchison, was installed by the committee of Dayton Presbytery appointed for the purpose. The committee on installation was composed of Rev. D. L. Murchison and Rev. D. G. Smith of the Dayton Presbytery and Rev. Dr. McKibben, President of Lane Theological Seminary of the Cincinnati Presbytery.

Church Crowded

Mr. Murchison is a graduate of the Lane seminary, of other ministers were on the platform and held a part in the service; the Rev. J. S. Mitchell of the Presbytery of Whitewater, who offered the prayer of installation and sang a beautiful solo and the Rev. John H. Yates of the Church of the Ascension of the city, who dismissed the congregation with the apostolic benediction.

Installation Services

After the sermon, the beautiful and impressive service of installation was conducted by the moderator in which the newly elected pastor, who was to preach the sermon. He made some very happy allusions to the number of Lane graduates who were present at the service and to his pleasure at having some part in the constituting of the pastorate of one of his boys. His sermon was a masterly presentation of the dignity and sacredness of the Christian ministry in interpreting the truth of God's Word, an ad of the high responsibility of adhering to the truth despite the opposition of an unbelieve world and an indifferent church. His text was taken from Dan. 5:17, and the beautiful historical setting given to the sermon made the figure of Daniel stand forth in impressive relief as a noble example for the Christian minister of today.

Charges People

The Rev. Mr. Smith, pastor of the First Presbyterian church of this city charged the people. He met them on the plane of former friendship and acquaintance, as many of the members of the new organization were formerly members of the First Church, and several of the members of his own church were present.

Mr. Smith also impressed the duty of loyalty in praying for the pastor, and "making their lives the best fruit of his ministry," the best recommendation of the church and the gospel. Mr. Smith's address was illustrated by several incidents drawn from personal knowledge, that show how it is in the power of congregations to make or unmake the work of the minister, according as their attitude is one of deep consecration and friendly cooperation or of indifference and destructive criticism. He introduced a quotation from the evangelist, "Billy" Sunday that tells in his inimitable irony how to prevent a church from growing.

The service was interesting and impressive and was calculated to launch the new minister and the new church under the most happy auspices. At the close of the services a beautiful bouquet was presented to Mr. Murchison, and the officers, members and many friends crowded to the front to offer the new pastor their congratulations and best wishes.
