### THE WAR OPERATIONS.

As Lord Roberts' victorious army advances northward, his advanced guard have reached Sand River, which is but 51 miles from Kroonstadt. It is at the latter important railway centre that a railway line from the south-east joins the main line from Bloemfontein to Pretoria. This south-eastern line extends through Bethlehem, Harrismith, Van Reenan's Pass on to Ladysmith and Durban in Natal. General French, concerning whose operations little has been heard for some time past, is believed to be endeavoring to seize this railway at some point near or south-east of Bethlehem and so cut the Boer line of communication between Kroonstadt and Van Reenan's Pass, the importance of which could hardly be overrated.

Once in possession of a part of this railway an effort would be made to secure the entire line down to the pass, and thus take the enemy in the rear at that point. It is probable that before long this will be effected and will enable General Buller to advance through Van Reenan's pass into the Free State to co-operate with Lord Roberts there and in his march toward Pretoria. It is now tolerably clear that Buller's long inaction has been awaiting the development of Lord Roberts' advance, and his getting possession of the Ladysmith-Kroonstadt Railway referred to, so that when the forward movement from Natal takes place it may be made under the most advantageous conditions and with as small an expenditure of fighting force and blood as is possible.

As to the forces operating on the western border and moving northward to the relief of Mafeking an important advantage has been gained by the successful passage of the large Vaal River. Lord Roberts' advance through the Free State has no doubt also lessened the stress of the enemy's resistance on the border. In fact the time is now very near when the outlying Boer forces must be called in to make a united stand against the British centre which is closely threatening Johannesburg and Pretoria. It will be by no means surprising if the relief of Mafeking comes very soon in this way and before General Hunter's column has reached the beleaguered town.

The Halifax Herald's war correspondent Chibucto, writing from Bloemfontein confirms a report previously circulated that the Canadian soldiers have suffered severely from insects which infested the blankets served out to them. They found it almost impossible to free themselves of this "one of the plagues of Egypt." The same correspondent complains that the Canadians were not so well equipped with rubber blankets and other camping outfit necessary to their comfort as the British soldiers are. Many of the fever cases, he says are due to this fact, although sun fever has been much more common than the serious enteric fever.

### LETTER FROM MISS POPE

From the Examiner,  
GENERAL HOSPITAL,  
Rondebosch, April 9, 1900.

My Dear Mrs. Gardiner—Prince Edward Island's most generous gift arrived two days ago, and contains most welcome articles. If it had only come one day sooner I could have made two Canadian Tommy's hearts glad and bodies warm with one of those pretty dressing gowns each, to wear going home on board ship; one is a convalescent enteric, the other a surgical case covered with wounds and honors from Paardeberg, where, instead of looking for the bullets that went through him, he says he "hunted for his four missing teeth"! Then I gave a night-gown to a convalescent going down to Cape Town to do garrison duty, and

his thanks were unbounded. He is a gallant French Canadian with a bullet wound in the shoulder which he says is "nothing to get for the Queen." Few of the gifts sent will prove of greater value than those pretty and very comfortable things. I have divided them in four, and we shall each give out to those that come under our care. One lovely blanket I am keeping for a very bad case of enteric that I have at present belonging to Co. "C," such a nice man and so ill that I fear he will have a hard struggle to pull through; his temperature is unusually high, only being brought down to 103° by "cold packs," etc., and often running over 106. I am oh, so glad to be able to take care of him, but my heart is sad that nursing and treatment have so little effect. He is my greatest anxiety just now, and yet we have over 60 enterics. He is such a fine boy and so patient under the horrors of ice baths, ice caps, obnoxious mixtures etc. I am writing this in the tent beside him where I am waiting to see the effects of a powder before going to our quarters for the night. As yet, I have had no one from P. E. Island, and only one man from Company G., but rest assured I shall hold some things in reserve until I do. The surgical dressings, etc., will prove very useful and most acceptable, while the "billet doux" are especially unique. I have looked to find the "Absent minded Beggar" in some. Tommy loves him so. We are, I fear, on the verge of the rainy season and are daily hoping for orders to go up country,—Bloemfontein we hope. This camp is a most delightful spot in sunshine but with three days of consecutive rain, this week, one begins to feel a little melancholy, and that one's "field allowance" is earned. We are in a
