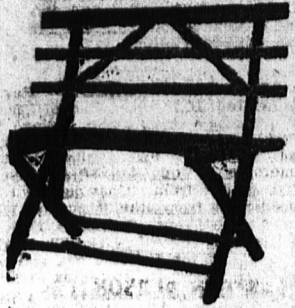

CIVIL SERVICE RECRUITS.—Attempts by recruiting campaigners upon the Civil Service as stickers last drawn from the secretary of the Civil Service Association a statement showing that 3,424 men from the Government service have enlisted—544 from Ottawa, 1,958 from outside, excluding railways, and 922 from the Government Railway system.

DAYLIGHT SAVING.—The Charlottetown City Council at a special meeting held last evening passed a resolution adopting the daylight saving system. The system according to this resolution is to go into effect on Friday night, June 30th, and will continue effective during July and August.

TO COMMAND BATTERY.—Captain W. A. McKee, formerly of Fredericton, has been given command of a battery of artillery in France, according to word received here. He has been in command of an ammunition column and is also reported to have been granted the rank of major. —Fredericton Gleaner.

MONEY ORDER OFFICE.—The Post Office Department has authorized the establishment of money order business at Central Beque on and from the 1st of July. This is in accordance with the regulation, which provides that every distributing office for a rural route shall be constituted a money order office in every case where the postal business transacted is sufficient to warrant such action.

WEDDING BELLS.—The marriage took place in St. Luke's Cathedral, Portland, Maine, on Wednesday, June 21st, at 8 p. m., of Miss Mary Rebecca Coles of Milton to Mr. Frank Coles, of the same place, the Rev. THE STEAMER.—The Car Ferry steamer docked in Charlottetown last evening at 8.15. She brought 26 passengers, three cars of freight, including a carload of gasoline engines and a car of empty egg cases.

PATROL BOAT IN PORT.—Patrol boat D. of the Fisheries Service, Capt. McCarthy arrived in Charlottetown on Sunday from Georgetown and other points on the Eastern coast. Capt. McCarthy reports that the lobster fishermen are meeting with fair success and that cod are plentiful especially large catches being taken at Souris. A few mackerel have been taken also at Souris but the catch taken on the whole has been small everywhere on the North and South sides. The patrol boat "D." is engaged at present in gathering the lobster spawn from the different canneries in King's County and delivering them to the hatchery at Georgetown. Upon the close of the lobster fishing season on June 30th Capt. McCarthy proceeds west to take up the usual patrol service to

see that the law with regard to poaching is enforced.

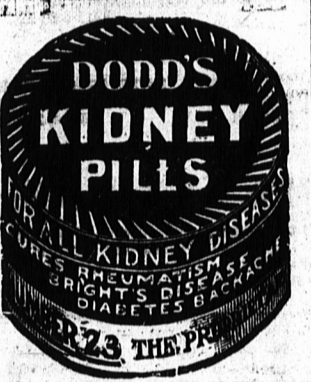
