The funeral of the late James R. McKee, who died yesterday in the P. E. I. Hospital, will take place Sunday afternoon from the First Methodist church, service commencing at 3.30 p. m., thence by train to Sherwood Cemetery. The pall bearers will be Benjamin Bremner, G. A. Sharp, F. H. Beer, Dr. Bagnall, J. A. Moore and John McNeill.

Yesterday was the first disagreeable day for some time. The high wind made it so by driving the rain through one's clothing. However it will do much good throughout the country as it will soften the sod land for plowing. Farmers were complaining that more plowshares have been worn out this fall than usual on account of the hard dry ground and that it is also harder on the horses as dry hard land is much heavier to plow than soft land. So it can be realized why the farmers want frequent rains throughout the season.

The following resolution which speaks for itself, was passed at a large and influential public meeting held under the auspices of the "Diamond Jubilee" meeting of the Grand Division, Sons of Temperance, at Kensington on the 23rd inst. Whereas the Province of Prince Edward Island is under a Prohibitory Liquor Law, and whereas the said Prohibitory Law is being violated through the importation of intoxicating liquors into the province for beverage purposes which is inimical to the said law, and whereas in the adjoining provinces, the Dominion Government has so amended the law as to prohibit the importation of alcoholic liquors for beverage purposes into counties in which the Scott Act is in force, therefore resolved, that this Grand Division and its friends in public meeting assembled, hereby place themselves on record as being opposed to such importation, and are strongly in favor of a law that will prevent the said importation of alcoholic liquors, for beverage purposes into this province, and further resolved that this Grand Division and friends assembled, appoint a committee of three to cooperate with the Dominion Alliance in presenting our claims, in this respect, upon our representatives for such legislation.

Many in this City and throughout the entire Province were deeply grieved yesterday to learn of the death of James R. McKee, which took place at the P. E. Island Hospital yesterday. Mr. McKee, entered the Hospital last week suffering from gangrene and was forced to have his leg amputated, but all that loving care and skill could do was unavailing and death occurred one day after the operation, in the midst of his family. Born February the seventeenth 1849, James Robert McKee was the only son of Margaret McAllister, who came from Donegal, Ireland and James McKee of St. John, N. B. His forefather left Waterford Ireland in the year 1720 settling on Rhode Island on land adjoining that of the founder of the Vanierbilt family. Leaving Rhode Island with the United Empire Loyalists he settled in St. John, N. B. Mr. McKee entered the I. C. R., in 1871 coming to this Province in May 1875, as yardmaster and conductor since 1887. He held the following membership in fraternal societies, Past Grand Patriarch of the Grand Encampment of Oddfellows, First Past Chancellor of Empire Lodge of K. of P., being a charter member of the first Lodge instituted in Canada at St. John, N. B. Past Chief Ranger of Court Avondale, I. O. O. F., also a prominent Mason and a member of the Order of Railroad conductors. At one time he was Lieutenant of the old Hook and Ladder company and in his early life was an active militiaman, having been a member of the first engineer corps. Mr. McKee's forefather's were men of large stature and strong physique which Mr. McKee inherited. He married Charlotte Tennant, who died only last February. The sons are James T. in St. John, George in Lynn, Mass.; Frank N. in Charlottetown; Harry C. B., a traveller; William A. in Moncton and Wallace F. T. in Winnipeg. The funeral will take place tomorrow afternoon at three thirty from the Methodist Church. The honorary pall-bearers will be six of the oldest Grand Past Masters of the Oddfellows.
