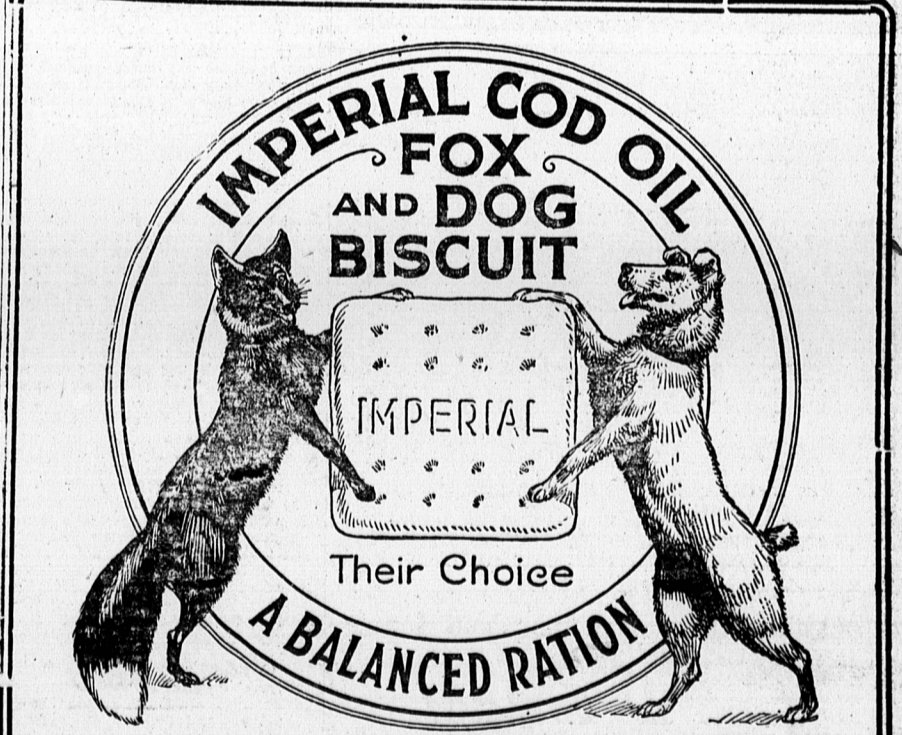

### Turks Ordered To Death For Wearing Fez

CONSTANTINOPE, Dec. 18.—The Angora government is determined that the Turks shall wear hats, or die.  
Carrying out the recent orders against the ancient fez, the Ankara Independence Tribunal today ordered eight new executions at Elazeh and 48 imprisonments of persons resisting the order to wear hats.  
The district has been greatly agitated at the orders, and many insurgents hitherto have declined to take kindly to the hard, soft, and medium hats of Europe.
