The Canadian championships are to be held in Montreal the latter part of August, when it is expected that Miss Mabel Thomson will represent the St. John Club. As Miss Thomson is playing better than ever, it is expected that she will give Miss Harvey, the present champion, a great struggle to retain the championship.

At the recent Moncton meeting, the 23rd trot and pace was won in straight heats by Storm King, from Bathurst, N. B., in the fast time of 2:23, 2:21, 2:23. He was a new comer to the provinces, and as he seemed able to go even faster the owner was asked by the judges for identification. IN MEMORIAM.
