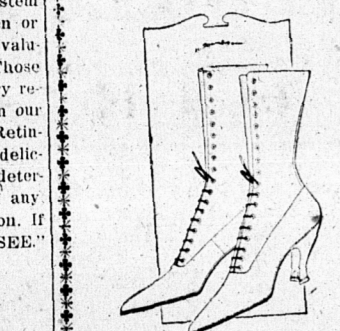

HINTS FOR  
THE MOTORIST

follows: The weak mixture produces  
an effective pressure, so low in com-  
parison with the resistance against  
which the engine is working, that any-  
ing the power stroke, the moving parts  
pass from a condition of delivering  
useful work to that of receiving power  
from the flywheel and, if there is  
looseness in the bearings of such  
parts, there is a tendency for such  
looseness or "play" to be taken up  
first in one direction and then in the  
other—the striking together of the  
surfaces involved being the immediate  
cause of the pounding. A research re-  
cently reported to the Society of  
Automotive Engineers throws light  
upon another kind of "gasknock." It  
seems that the gasoline now in use  
has a habit of burning by stages.  
There is a combustion when the spark  
occurs, that may result in the break-  
ing up of a portion of the fuel into  
compounds, which may then explode  
with very high pressure, detonate as  
it is called, if the temperature to  
which they are subjected is very high.  
It is these detonations, subsequent to  
the initial explosion and not self-ignition,  
that produce the knock in many  
engines, that run hot with too high  
compression. Pressure diagrams, are  
shown that seem to demonstrate this  
detonating action. The search also  
tends to indicate that carbon deposits  
cause knocking not by causing self-  
ignition, but by increasing the com-  
pression and combustion temperature  
to the point which detonating hydro-  
carbons are formed and fired.

THE HOME OF THE HON. AND MRS. I. S.  
Martin, Kinross, was deeply saddened  
by the death on the 23rd of May, of  
their son John W. Martin, Pte. Marlin  
was born July 14th 1896. He enlisted  
with the 105th and spent three years  
overseas. At the time he enlisted he  
was a splendid type of man. After  
training in England he crossed to  
France but was obliged to return to  
England for hospital treatment. Dur-  
ing his training he was selected for a  
tug-of-war. In a contest with a stal-  
wart team he received some injuries,  
which was the beginning of his illness.  
After a period of hospital treatment  
he was invalided home, and on arrival  
looked well; although not so robust as  
formerly. In the course of a few  
months he began to fail, and gradually  
wasted until a shadow of his former  
self; on the above mentioned date he  
fell asleep. He was most patient dur-  
ing his illness, always cheerful and  
optimistic, and glad to see his  
friends. All that medical skill and  
careful nursing could possibly do was  
done to hold him here without avail.  
His young life ended here in the prime  
of manhood—but he lives on; having  
finished his task here below.

The funeral services, the largest  
held in the community were conducted  
in the Orwell Head church on Sabbath  
May 25th, by the pastor assisted by  
Rev. J. C. Martin, uncle of the de-  
ceased. The interment was in Orwell  
Head Cemetery.

The pall bearers were returned sol-  
diers who tenderly laid away the re-  
mains of a comrade to rest in the com-  
mon bed of mankind until the resur-  
rection morn. The spirit had taken  
flight upwards to be with the redeem-  
ed.

Besides his parents, two sisters and  
three brothers Mrs. A. McLeod, of  
Montague and Mrs. W. Jenkins, of  
Seal River and Samuel, of Millville,  
Hugh James at home mourn their  
irreparable loss. The community  
sympathizes deeply with the family in  
their sad bereavement.

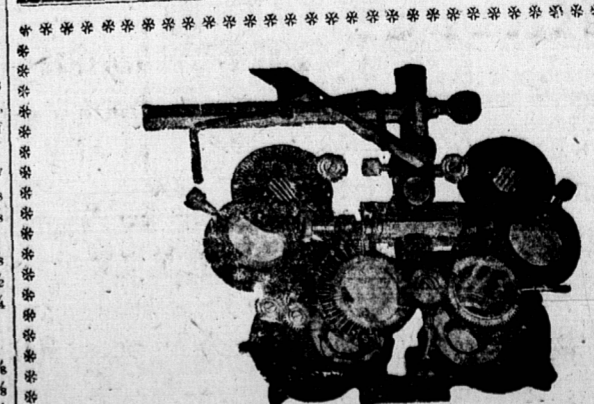
