THE CHARLOTTETOWN GUARDIAN
Amendments To City Incorporation Act Answers Tabled Before Legislature

Following is the text of the bill to amend the City of Charlottetown Incorporation Act, which was given first reading in the Legislature yesterday.

Police Administration
4. Section 129 of said Incorporation Act, as amended by 2 George VI, Cap. 29, is hereby repealed and the following enacted in lieu thereof:
(1) The administration of the City Police force within the City of Charlottetown shall be vested in the Police Committee of the City Council, who shall have the control and management of such Police and shall prescribe and regulate their duties.

Assessments
2. Section 83 of said Incorporation Act is hereby struck out and the following enacted in lieu thereof:
(1) It shall be lawful for the City Council to allow such rate or rates of discount, not exceeding five per cent, as it may by law fix and determine, on all assessments and on real estate, personal property or income, in full or in determined instalments with- in such time or times after the completion of assessment as such by-law may provide, and such rate or rates may be such by-law made variable according to the time or term of payment.

Proceedings In Legislature
The Legislature met at 9:40 p.m. yesterday and adjourned at 4 o'clock, to meet at 10 o'clock this morning when Premier Campbell will move the House into committee on Supply.

Expropriation Settlements

Dr. Philippe Panetton, Montreal, writes under the pen-name "Ringer" in an eye-spectator in Montreal. He studied in Paris in 1920-23 and returned to Canada to practice. In 1929 he began his "Thirty Acres" on which he spent ten years. When it was published in Paris, it received the Grand Prix du Roman of the French Academy, the Prix du Roman Regional (Girard), and the Prix des Vikings. In 1940 the book appeared from Toronto in the English translation of Felix and Dorothea Walter. It has also been translated into German, Dutch and Spanish.

The present award is the second that Professor Pratt has taken. The Governor-General's medal for poetry is a native of Newfoundland, he has resided in Ontario 34 years and teaches English at Victoria College, University of Toronto. His first book was Newfoundland Verse (1923) and among his ten volumes are "Titans," "The Roosevelt and the Antine," "Many Moods," "The Goats," for which he received the 1937 award. He has also been awarded the Lorne Pierce Gold Medal for distinguished service to Canadian Literature. Last year he was Toronto Branch President of the Canadian Authors' Association. He edits the Canadian Poetry Magazine. The medals, carrying the Canadian coat-of-arms and suitable inscriptions, will be presented at the Authors' convention at Vancouver in August. For 1939 the awards were: General Literature, Laura Goodman Salverson, Winnipeg; Poetry, "The Immigrant's Confessions," an Immigrant's Daughter," Felton, Franklin Davey, McWell, Toronto; "The Champlain Road," Poetry, Arthur S. Bourinot, Ottawa, "Under the Sun,"
