Mr. M. Martin, K. C., was elected vice-president while Mr. J. J. Morris was re-elected Provincial Commissioner.

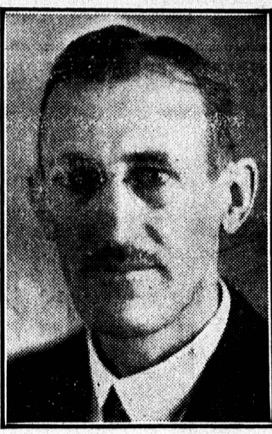
The patron of the Association is His Honor Lieutenant Governor George D. DeBlois while the Premier, Hon. Thane A. Campbell is honorary president.

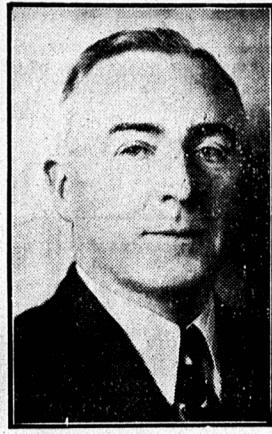

Paris Relatives Of Jewish Slayer Are Fined And Sentenced

NEW ANGLE TO ANTI-JEWISH DESTRUCTION

German Insurance Firms Seek Payment From Foreign Underwriters. BY LOUIS F. LOCHNER BERLIN, Nov. 29.—(AP)—German insurance firms made an international question today of broken promises which one insurance company has made in anti-Jewish violence Nov. 10. The German companies submitted claims to foreign—primarily British—underwriters who carried re-insurance on the hundreds of Jewish synagogues, stores and homes which were burned, looted and damaged in what propaganda minister Goebbels called "spontaneous demonstrations" after a Jewish boy killed a German diplomat in Paris.

Parliament Will Open January 12

OTTAWA, Nov. 29.—(CP)—Prime Minister Mackenzie King announced tonight the Government had chosen Jan. 12 for opening the next session of Parliament. This date, he said at a press conference following a Cabinet meeting, had been considered most suitable having regard to the convenience of members coming from a long distance, and to the desire of the Government to have its legislative program ready.

Canada Will Celebrate King's Birthday May 20

OTTAWA, Nov. 29.—(CP)—Celebration of the King's Birthday will be observed next May 20 while His Majesty and Queen Elizabeth are in Ottawa, it was announced here tonight by Prime Minister MacKenzie King after a Cabinet Council.

Yangtze River To Remain Closed To Neutral Shipping

SHANGHAI, Nov. 29.—(AP)—The Japanese Army and Navy told foreign powers tonight that the Yangtze River, China's trade route, would remain closed to neutral shipping until China is conquered. A spokesman said later that the announcement was issued without orders from Tokyo.

SATISFACTORY LONDON FUR SALE REPORT

McLure and MacKinnon have received word from London, England, via Winnipeg the following detailed cable report of the Hudson's Bay November Silver Fox Sale. Owing to the late pelting season in Norway and Sweden this year the offering of 5,292 skins of the silver fox sale of the 1938-39 season was considerably below the quantity catalogued at the corresponding sale last year. During the past few weeks there has been a steady clearance of goods remaining over from last season, therefore the skins offered at the present sale consisted largely of early shipments of the new season. There was a good demand for all color phases, especially for skins up to five pounds in value and up to seven pounds in the case of skins of good character and clear color. Lesser interest, however, was shown in first quality skins of which there were very few offered.

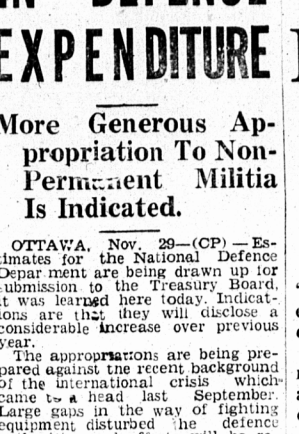


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Five Persons "Lost" In Forced Landing Of Airliner In Water

(A. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 29.—Five persons disappeared in the racing Pacific Ocean today after a luxury liner of the United Air Lines sank in the water, out of sight, after a ten-hour search. Two others, including the pilot, escaped to the shore before the land ship was crushed against the rocky coast in an accident which was being variously investigated and reported today. Five guardmen tonight abandoned hope of finding any of the five missing persons alive and terminated their day-long search. The victims, dropped off the plane one by one, after the transport was brought down safely on the water shortly before dawn 35 miles north of San Francisco. Three persons were known to have reached shore, but one of them, the only woman aboard, was swept back into the boiling surf when she dodged the swinging wing of the plane.

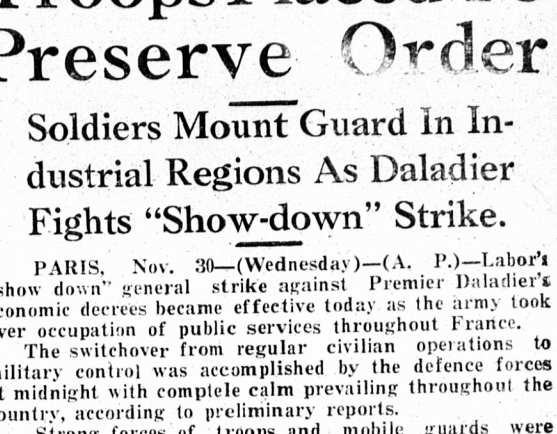


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Germany Boasts Peace-time Army Of Nearly One Million

BERLIN, Nov. 29.—(AP)—Germany's standing army has been increased by four corps, the press disclosed today. The Nazi Reich now is generally credited with a peacetime army of approximately 1,000,000 men as compared with 600,000 before the outbreak of the war. (This is second only to the Soviet Union, which has a peacetime army of 1,300,000.) The strength of 36 divisions set by the 1935 conscription law, which introduced Chancellor Hitler's rearmament program has been raised to 51 divisions. Newspapers revealed these included three specially equipped mountain divisions, five armored car or tank divisions, in addition to cavalry forces.

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Fire Sweeps Duvar's Garage, Prince Street

Fire which broke out at an early hour this morning practically destroyed the garage run by Mr. Arthur Duvar on Prince Street. The building is owned by Mr. Bruce MacEwen, Morell, and is leased by the Irving Oil Company. Six motor vehicles were stored in the garage. Three were hauled from the burning building, but it is impossible to remove the remaining three stored to the back and left hand side of the building. The three motor vehicles removed were a Ford truck owned by W. R. Dennis of the Cash and Carry Store, City. Buick Coupe believed to be owned by Pete Hennigar, City. Chevrolet sedan owned by a Miss Keeping of Kentville, Nova Scotia. These believed lost in the fire were: One-half International ton truck owned by Mr. Dan MacPhee, Clyde River. Oldsmobile coupe owned by Mr. Samuel Kennedy, City. Wrecking truck owned by Arthur Duvar, garage manager. The fire was first discovered about 4:45 and the building was a mass of flames before the firemen arrived. Streams of water were soon plying on the flames which were concentrated to the rear and center of the structure and the firemen shortly had the blaze safe from spreading to other nearby buildings. It was impossible, however, to do much to save the structure. After the firemen had safely confined the blaze to the rear of the building the front doors were thrown open and the three cars removed. The fire-damaged cars which had previously collapsed prevented the removal of the other vehicles. Records, equipment and stores were removed from the garage office, but valuable working equipment and tools in the rear workshop were not. The loss sustained by Mr. Duvar was partially covered by insurance, but it was not known if the building itself was insured. The origin of the blaze, which broke out in the rear of the garage was unknown.
