SAD BEREAVEMENT.—The death occurred suddenly at her home, 122 Dresden Row, Halifax Saturday night, of Mrs. Ellen Matson, age 65 years, widow of Geo. Matson, a well known marine engineer of Halifax, who died some years ago. She was a daughter of the late Andrew Hillman. She leaves two sons—Stanley J., at home and Frank, in Charlottetown; in Johnston & Johnston's Drugstore, and one daughter Mrs. George Rutherford, of New York, and one brother, Joseph Hillman, of Halifax.

AT GOVERNOR'S ISLAND.—The following is a summary of the work done to date by the Henry L. Doeherty Company who are engaged in drilling for oil on Governor's Island: December 1st—Drilling started, 27 feet first day, December 2nd, Operations continued, the bore reaching to 41 feet, drilling however had to be abandoned for the time being due to striking a large flow of fresh water, which first made its appearance at 23 feet. The water caused the well to cave and also drained the other wells nearby; consequently no steam was available with which to carry on operations. December 3rd, Bruce Stewart and Co., engaged to build a special casing 25 feet long and 25 inches in diameter. The casing proved a success from the beginning with the result that the leak was stopped and abundance of fresh water on hand. December 4th to the 19th drilling was at a standstill; on the latter date work was resumed to a depth of 51 feet. December 20th, red sandstone is still being gone through and the latest from headquarters report the work going merrily on at 90 feet. The engineer in charge says that the work of drilling is considerably slower than they are accustomed to on account of the tools sticking to the sides of the bore. The necessary change of drills, etc., entails considerable time, hence the delay. Nevertheless Mr. Poinsett, City agent informed a Guardian representative that in the course of two or three days they expect to have the well to a depth of 200 feet, after which the surface casing will be set. This respite will therefore give the drillers a few days off the job, and as a consequence all hope to be in the city for their Christmas dinner. There was a rumor about the city yesterday with reference to oil being struck. This rumor has no foundation as nothing of the like is expected to happen, not for many months yet at any rate.
