### On The Slicing Of Bacon

How thick should a slice of bacon be?

Most bacon-for-breakfast enthusiasts are hearty trenchmen and consequently are inclined to say that all slices of bacon, except those they slice themselves, are too thin.

But others, whose palates are pleased with delicate shades of flavor, find that such nuances are readily obtained by the thinness of the slice and that they can enjoy with a tissue-paper fragment of pork.

There is a sharp cleavage of opinion on this important question. It has come to a head in the belovéd State of Tennessee where in response to public clamor the State Legislature is dealing with the question.

It appears that of late bacon has been sliced too thin in that State. It is averred that someone has invented a machine which will slice bacon "to such an infinitesimal thinness as to make it invisible to the naked eye at a distance of four feet when lying on a white plate."

But whose eye is four feet from the plate when they sit down to breakfast? And anyway bacon is not sliced for purposes of being looked at but in order to be fried, broiled, grilled or otherwise processed and then eaten.

Anyway the hearty trenchmen of Tennessee rebelled against the thinness of the slices and took the matter to the Legislature which now has before it a bill pegging the thickness and area of a slice at a minimum. The dimensions set down in the bill are that the slice shall not be shorter than 1-7/8 inches nor less than 1-1/2 of an inch thick.

Now this doesn't seem reasonable. If one takes a slice of that

### Lord Tweedsmuir Heard At Halifax

HALIFAX, June 9—There was an "uncommon lot of nonsense being talked about races" in Europe, Lord Tweedsmuir declared in an address yesterday before a representative gathering of Halifax professional and business men.

The Governor-General and Lady Tweedsmuir arrived in Halifax last night on their first official visit to Nova Scotia. The Vice Regal party will leave tomorrow for Fredericton, N. B.

"The strongest peoples have always been a mingling of races," Lord Tweedsmuir declared, "but they are only strong if that mingling is conducted in the proper way. And that proper way is that each accepts and appreciates the qualities of the other, that each learns from the other, and that while they cherish their own special loyalties and traditions, they cherish not less that new loyalty and tradition which springs from their union."

In the forenoon, guns from historic Citadel Hill boomed forth a salute as Nova Scotia and Halifax officially welcomed the Vice Regal couple.

Premier Angus L. Macdonald and Mayor Walter Mitchell expressed loyalty on behalf of Nova Scotia and Halifax at Lord and Lady Tweedsmuir were formally welcomed to the province in the Red Chamber of the Province House.

MONCTON, N. B., June 9—Lord Tweedsmuir, Canada's Governor-General, who with Lady Tweedsmuir and their entourage was in Moncton here Monday afternoon en route to Halifax might well not have reached Moncton, according to a passenger of the Canadian National Railway.

Disaster skirted the Governor-General at Campbellton, when the spot over which he had passed by a falling 500 pound coping stone from the stop of the station, Lord Tweedsmuir was scarcely 30 feet past the spot when the stone fell and crushed an express truck like an eggshell, the passenger said.

The Governor-General made no mention of the incident but those who witnessed it were breathless at the narrow escape of the representative of the King.

### Brief Funeral Rites For Jean Harlow

GLENDALE, Calif., June 9—(AP)—Hollywood said goodbye to Jean Harlow today with a simple 20-minute funeral service in a suburban chapel overflowing with flowers.

William Powell, a suitor of the actress was visibly shaken as he entered the Wee Kirk O' The Heather Church. When he left, supporting Miss Harlow's mother, Mrs. Jean Bello, he seemed more morn composed.

Mrs. Bello was weeping.

The mother, Powell and Jean's father, Dr. Mont Clair Carpenter of Kansas City, were the last to look upon her. Until they decide on disposition, the body will remain in a receiving vault near the chapel.

Barely 250 persons, most of them Hollywood stars and studio executives, were admitted to the service.

Clark Gable was both an usher and pall-bearer.

### Belgian Veterans Protest Amnesty

BRUSSELS, June 9—(AP)—Aroused by a proposal before the Senate to grant amnesty to all war-time prisoners, 400 Belgian veterans today protested by showering the tomb of the unknown soldier with their medals.

Mounted troops and tanks were thrown about the Parliament Buildings after the demonstration.

A delegation of veterans swore before the Speaker of the Senate to kill any "traitor" who professed by amnesty. The exercise men measure would not come up for a vote today but a further demonstration tomorrow was feared if the amnesty discussion in the Senate proceeds as scheduled.

### IN MEMORIAM

MR. ALEXANDER MATHESON

On Sunday, March 28th, Mr. Alexander Matheson, a very highly esteemed resident of Mount Vernon passed peacefully away at the age of 65 years.

The deceased had not been in a very good condition of health for some months but it was hoped that after having taken a more or less prolonged rest he would then be ready to again take up his duties. During the greater part of the winter he was able to move about the house and suffered little or no pain. But while this was so, his strength did not return as it was expected that it would have done. In the late winter it became evident that instead of improving in health he was gradually growing weaker. In spite of all that could be done he continued to sink until on the above mentioned date his gentle spirit winged its homeward flight.

Besides a sorrowing widow, Mr. Matheson leaves to mourn the loss of a kind and loving father, three sons, namely, Duncan and William at home, and Stewart, at present in Upper Belle River.

Mr. Alexander Matheson was the only son of Mr. and Mrs. Duncan Matheson, both of whom emigrated from Scotland. In their family were one son and two daughters. One daughter, Mrs. Jonathan D. Morrison survives the deceased brother Alexander; the other sister, Mrs. Effie Bruce passed away over twenty years ago.

Mr. Matheson was a man who was well known throughout the whole countryside and held in respect and esteem by all.

He was a very successful farmer and for quite a number of years he was in charge of the Experimental Stations operated under the direction of the Prince Edward Island Agricultural Department.

He took a deep interest in all that pertained to the welfare of the school, the church, and the community, and he ever stood ready to help out in every good cause. For many years he had been a loyal supporter of the Presbyterian Church and at the time of the disruption in 1925 he remained true to the church of his fathers.

He will be much missed in the various activities of the outside world. But still it is in the home that his loss will be felt most keenly. Here his loved ones will often long in vain for his genial presence and his words of wise counsel and good cheer.

### Soviet Shakes-up Army Leadership

MOSCOW, June 9—(AP)—The Soviet Union shook up its army command today in drastic changes involving key frontier garrisons from Leningrad to the Persian border.

The changes meant new army leadership along the whole western frontier, which Soviet spokesmen profess to believe Germany may attack some day.

The action followed the death June 1 of General Jan Gamarnik, vice-commissioner for defence. The Government said he committed suicide after he had been exposed as a traitor with close connections with Germany and Japan.

### Dr. Norman Bethune To Return To Spain

NEW YORK, June 9—Dr. Norman Bethune, of Montreal, founder and head of the Canadian blood transfusion unit on the Madrid front, has returned "to report to those who sent me—the Canadian workers."

Expecting a long civil war, Dr. Bethune will return to Spain shortly to resume command of the unit that includes a staff of 25, including four Canadians. He expressed himself as firmly convinced that when the "non-intervention force" ended, the Spanish Government would sweep the insurgent enemy into the sea.

Since January, the tall, greying physician said, his unit had given 700 blood transfusions to soldiers and civilians within a 125-kilometre radius of Madrid.

He ran a "glorified milk service". A group of 1200 soldiers and civilians, men and women, boys and girls, were donors. Their blood was bottled, mixed with a six per cent of sodium citrate for preservation and rushed out by five fast cars
