Men Willing To Compromise

(Canadian Press) HALIFAX, N. S., Dec. 7.—Representatives of the running trades met at Stellarton and Truro over the week end to discuss action to be taken in connection with the proposed ten per cent cut in railway wages, but no statements were given out. At Truro, however, it was understood the members of granite rock division 149, brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers, had expressed their willingness to accept a five per cent cut until June if there was to be no mileage reduction. Decisions reached by the various lodges will be forwarded to the General chairman of the organizations at Montreal.

Discussing Wage Reduction

(Canadian Press) MONCTON, N. B., Dec. 7.—With the exception of a statement given out by the local lodge, Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers, to the effect that action in regard to the ten per cent wage-cut would be left in the hands of the general chairmen, no announcement was made by the four running trades lodges which met here. It was understood that all the lodges, including conductors, trainmen, and firemen and engine-men, were in agreement with the engineers' attitude. The telegraphers will meet tonight.

Department Of Justice Will Give Ruling

Ottawa, Ont., Dec. 7. (By the Canadian Press)—The right of the Railway companies to make a ten per cent cut in employees' wages retroactive to November 15, is now before the Department of Justice. Departmental officials could give no indication this evening as to when a ruling on the point may be expected.

It is understood that the position of the railway companies is that they have complied with the provisions of the industrial act and that they are within their rights in setting the date when the cut shall go into effect. As the question in dispute apparently requires interpretation of the act, the Department of Justice has been asked to consider the matter and give a ruling.

To Discuss New Trade Agreement

Ottawa, Ont., Dec. 7. (By the Canadian Press)—Hon. H. H. Stevens, Minister of Trade and Commerce, will leave tomorrow for Vancouver whence he sails on December 19 for Honolulu to discuss a new trade agreement with representatives of the New Zealand Government. On his way West, Mr. Stevens will address the boards of trade at Winnipeg and Regina.

RUMOR UNFOUNDED

ST. VINCENT DE PAUL Sewing Circle held their annual meeting at Notre Dame Academy on the afternoon of Dec. 3rd. Rt. Rev. Mar. Maurice MacDonald occupying the chair. All officers of preceding year were unanimously returned to office, viz: President, Mrs. J. MacAulay; Vice-president, Mrs. F. McKearney and the undersigned Secretary. The ladies decided to meet at 2 o'clock each Thursday afternoon for sewing. They are preparing for an exceptionally heavy year's work, as already there are many demands for clothing. The meeting closed with Benediction of the Most Blessed Sacrament, given by the Rt. Rev. Director in the Convent Chapel.

AT GYRO—Miss Margaret Anstey, director of the Children's Aid Society of St. John and a member of the Canadian Council for family and child welfare, was the speaker at the regular weekly Gyro dinner held last evening at the Canadian National Hotel. Her talk was along the line of Social Service work. In dealing with some phases of the problems in this work, she stated that this is the only province with no trained social worker and in which no organized social work is being done. She stated, however, that a lot of splendid work is carried on but there is much lost effort due to lack of proper co-ordination. "If you give relief there should be some plan behind it," she stated. The reason behind the request for aid should be investigated and righted. Family work is important. Never give relief without service. She went on to relate several cases typical of her work to show the great need for properly directed effort. The idea behind a social service organization is not to interfere with any work that is being done at the present time but to go further in supplementing the present excellent work and by effecting a proper co-ordination of all effort so that the causes of the need for relief will be corrected. It is largely a work of prevention. The social service work is generally financed by subscription from charitable organizations, service clubs, grants from the city, the province, etc. A vote of thanks moved by Dr. P. A. Creelman, seconded by President Russ Chandler was tendered the speaker by the chairman, Dr. B. C. Keating.

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
