THE GIVING AND RECEIVING OF GIFTS, AGAINST SO-CALLED PROTECTION.

All thinking men are agreed that a gift or a favor from a litigant whose case comes before him, or that a voter must not accept a gift from a candidate. Gifts may be in other cases given and received with a clear conscience, and such transactions are not immoral in themselves, if the motives of the giver and the recipient are pure and the occasion and circumstances are fitting. But a gift bestowed with the hope of inducing the recipient to grant equal or greater favors in return, and especially a gift bestowed in the hope that the receiver will grant favors in return at the expense of some other person or of the country, is immoral. All such gifts come within the prohibition of Moses, "Thou shalt not respect persons nor take a gift, for a gift doth blind the eyes of the wise." Of this class also are the gifts referred to by Solomon when he wrote, "A gift destroyeth the heart," and "He that hateth gifts shall live."

This class of giving and receiving gifts and favors of divers sorts has been unearthed quite extensively in connection with the inquiry into the affairs of the Marine Department agencies at Quebec, St. John and Halifax. It would be a mistake to assume that such wrongful and immoral giving and receiving of gifts is confined to one department or to the official life of the country. It is a mercenary practice that has prevailed and still prevails widely in the commercial and industrial world and in the political world as well. In fact in a large proportion of the positions of trust where a person is buying or selling for others, the temptation may be presented to bestow or receive unlawful or immoral gifts, perhaps under cloak of what is customary or common. It will be well if the lessons of the Marine inquiry shall have the effect of creating a higher moral tone and a stricter observance of the proprieties both outside of and within the public service in this matter of giving and receiving gifts and favors where a sinister object lurks in the background.

Ohio passed a local option law last spring and already under its provisions thirty-two counties containing a million people have gone "dry," and only two voted to continue "wet." The number of saloons closed is 853. A large number of additional option elections are now to come off. The prohibition wave still sweeps onward.

The Bishop of London the other day in advocating the new license bill pointed out that in proportion to population the drink bill of Canada was but one fourth as great as the British drink bill, and booze is cheap in England, too. Very many men in proportion to the size of the drink bill is the amount of pauperism in the British Isles the number of paupers is almost equal to the entire population of Canada west of the great lakes. It is greater than the total population of the three Maritime Provinces.

The inheritance tax is being farmed by Germany for all it is worth. At present large estates are taxed as much as 25 per cent when they pass to collateral heirs, or to strangers. Now a new scheme has been prepared under which only those within the first and second degrees of relationship can inherit, and failing such heirs the property will escheat to the state. But relatives outside of the direct line will be permitted to purchase family holdings from the Government at half price, or small plots of land belonging to a deceased relative at 90 per cent of the market value. This gives an inkling of the taxation in military countries, of which we know nothing in Canada.

The Montreal Witness strongly supported the Laurier Government during the recent federal elections, but it finds many things under Government control which are not as they should be. Among other things it says: "So much has been found rotten in the Department of Marine and Fisheries that the public will insist upon the inquiry being extended to the Departments of Militia, Public Works, Railways and other departments. In addition to that the reforms in the civil service must be extended to cover the whole service and the election laws further amended to make saw-offs criminal offences, and generally in the interests of purity."

A few days ago the New York World printed what purported to be an interview of Dr. William Bayard Hale with the German Emperor. It was extremely sensational, and certainly calculated to make international trouble. The World has since editorially pronounced the interview "stupidly absurd, mistaken, misleading and mischievous." It lays the blame on Dr. Hale. This gentleman admits having talked with a reporter of the World and that the reporter afterward read over the report of the interview to him. Dr. Hale avers that he told the reporter it was "all rubbish," and that it was "a pure fake." Thus it is a case of veracity between The World and Dr. Hale. A synopsis of the alleged interview appeared in The Guardian on the day following its publication in New York, and was credited to The World.
