At nine o'clock, Saturday night a horse belonging to W. Henry Atkin took fright at the lower end of Queen st., and dashed up town scattering pedestrians and turning one team upside down. From different sources it appears that the ice is pretty well cleared out of the Gulf of St. Lawrence. Atlantic is now, including Spanish Bay, completely clear of ice. Telegrams from the Superintendent of the signal service at Low Point have announced officially that all the Gulf steamers report no ice in sight.

The Guardian is in receipt of the following from R. V. E. J. Rattee, written May 13, who is attending the World's Sunday School Convention at Rome: "The first session of the World's Sunday School Convention is over. Our American cousins are first in number of representatives and I think, strong British and Canadian, as I am that it becomes us all to acknowledge that they carried off the palm in this evening's meeting. It would be impossible to write in detail all that took place. But first, the American Ambassador, Lloyd Griscom was present and gave us hearty greetings. He confessed to me like Paul he was 'an ambassador in bonds,' yet, could not refuse the invitation of E. K. Warren to be present and welcome 500 of his fellow-citizens to Rome." And he ended by inviting us all to a reception at his residence next Wednesday. Then Mr. Warren read a letter from President Roosevelt in which that first citizen of the great Republic wrote in laudatory terms of the world-wide Sunday school movement's effort to give to all children the moral and spiritual education so essential to true development. General Garibaldi's son and grand daughter with a few words most eloquently expressed, roused the gathering to great enthusiasm, when they bade us "God-speed" in our visit to Italy. And what shall I say of Campbell Morgan's splendid declaration? "That Empire only lasting which puts the child in the midst." Twenty-seven countries were represented tonight. What shall be on the morrow, and Monday to the end? I have stood upon the ruins of the old rostra where Cleo's thundered, and upon the spot where Juffus Caesar was slain with many wounds, have visited St. Peter's, and many other churches, have seen the original works of these great masters, Michael Angelo and Raphael. What inspirations should be mine!"
