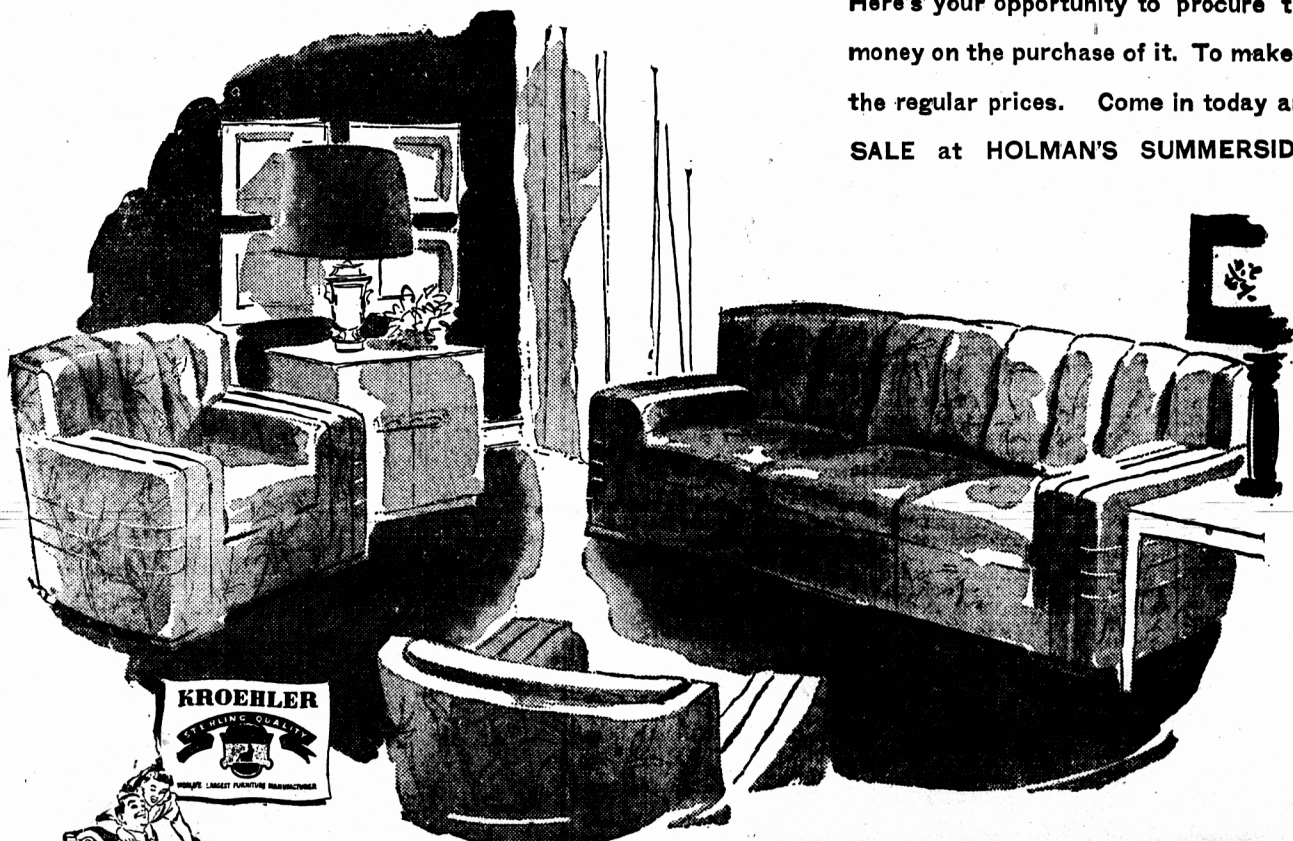

Islanders I Have Met

By 'Islander Abroad'

Winnipeg, Man. — Today, I met one of the members of the Oxenham family, Mrs. Alexander Ross of 212 Martin Ave., Winnipeg, daughter of the late Thomas and Sarah (Matheson) Oxenham of Brookfield, P. E. I., who came west in 1913 in company with her mother, one sister and one brother. The mother, Mrs. Oxenham, passed away in 1917, and the remains were taken to P. E. I., and interred beside that of her husband in the old Greenvale cemetery where once stood the Methodist Church, which I understand, was moved to Hunter River many years ago, and is now the United Church there.

Donald Matheson of Glasgow, Scotland, later of Rustico Road, P. E. I., a shipbuilder by trade, married Mrs. Blatch — formerly Ann Hooper of the Milton district — a widow with two children, Rebecca (Mrs. John Matheson) and Philip Blatch. To Donald and Ann (Hooper Blatch) Matheson were born six

children, David, Benjamin, Charles, Susanna, Catherine (Mrs. Joseph Matheson) and Sarah (Mrs. T. Oxenham).

On the John Matheson farm there was built the Glasgow Road Church in connection with the Church of Scotland in P. E. I., as a later fruit of the labours of the late Rev. Donald MacDonald, who did a great part of his ministerial and pastoral work in the Rustico section — The members of the old and former congregation of Mr. MacDonald are buried in the old Portage Cemetery.

The Glasgow Road congregation had for a number of years the faithful and untiring services of the well loved under shepherd, the late Rev. Daniel MacLean. This congregation is now a part of the Brookfield charge in connection with the Presbyterian Church in Canada and has for its minister, the Rev. Donald Nicholson.

Mrs. Lois MacDonald on the staff of the P. E. Island Hospital, Charlottetown, and Mrs. Philip Matheson, whose husband is a Conservative member of the P. E. I. Legislative Assembly, are granddaughters of the late John and Rebecca (Blatch) Matheson.

David Matheson (son of Donald and Ann Matheson) was married to a Jane Hooper of Milton, P. E. I. Their daughter, Georgia, Mrs. John Angus MacKinnon, lives

in Winnipeg, and has two children, John and Isabel, who are at college, one training to be a druggist, the other as a dietitian.

Mr. MacKinnon, formerly of Brookfield, P. E. I., is an employee of the C. N. R. Another daughter, Mrs. Langley, passed away in Regina, Sask., a few years ago.

The Oxenham family consists of eight children, Gertrude (Mrs. A. Ross), Mae and Isaac of Winnipeg, Mrs. Rear and Walter of West Kildonan (suburb of Winnipeg), and Arthur of St. James (suburb of Winnipeg). Mrs. Dempsey and Mrs. Dixon are deceased.

Mr. and Mrs. A. Ross have two children, Betty (who was an employee with the Great West Life, Winnipeg), Mrs. Haig; and Jean (an employee with the Clark Bros. Ltd.). Mrs. Cherry; both living in Winnipeg.

Mr. Haig is an electrical engineer with the City Hydro, Winnipeg; and Mr. Cherry is a chemist with the Winnipeg Electric Co. Mrs. Ross is a graduate of Prince of Wales College and taught several years in the Island schools.

Mr. Ross, who emigrated to this country from Haddington (near Edinburgh) Scotland, is an employee at the City of Winnipeg Assessment office. Mr. Rear came west in 1901.

Mr. Rear who was well known as a breeder of thoroughbred Belgian horses and about whom a book is being written for the agricultural circles, passed away a few years ago, leaving besides a widow, one daughter, Elaine, stenographer with the Canadian Pacific Airways, Vancouver, B. C.

Mae (single) came West in 1913 with Mrs. Ross and her mother, and is now retired.
