A Timely Warning

The apparent ease with which a nation at war finances its costly operations, while at the same time relieving unemployment and other perplexing social problems, creates a false impression that the process might be indefinitely continued.

Political freedom and economic freedom are two sides of the same coin; they cannot be separated, Mr. Zeller declared.

He said that Canadians are willing to submit to the present system of government control because at all costs they want to win the war.

"There is abroad in the world today a large, growing and dangerous body of opinion which, if it triumphs, must mean the doom of freedom and democracy," he declared.

While the government must exercise the fullest control over our lives and resources, necessary to a maximum war effort, he expressed his conviction that it had no right to regiment our economic life in time of peace.
