TO STUDY FAUNA AND FLORA OF AFRICA

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 22.—King Albert of the Belgians, in the interest of scientific research has decreed that a large area be set aside in Belgian Congo, for the preservation of the fauna and flora of Africa and for the scientific study of rare species in their natural environment. Announcement of the establishment of the scientific preserve was made by Prince De Ligne, the Belgian Ambassador at Washington, on receipt of cable dispatches from Brussels. The sanctuary will be known as the Albert National Park. It is situated on the Eastern part of the Belgian Congo, between Lake Kivu and Lake Edward and comprises:

approximately 800,000 acres. Administration will be in the hands of a commission on which King Albert has already appointed two scientists Dr. John D. Merriam, president of the Carnegie Institution, and Dr. Henry Fairfield Osborn, president of the American Museum of Natural History. A decree by King Albert prohibits under severe penalties the killing, capture or molestation of any wild animal within the area, including those which are considered dangerous. It is also prohibited to destroy or remove any tree or wild plant or to change in any way the aspect of the landscape. The sanctuary will be policed by Belgian colonial officers and no one will be allowed to enter without a special permit.

"Many rare species of animals which have almost disappeared from other parts of the world," the announcement said, "are making their last stand in this section of Africa and it is King Albert's purpose to preserve them so that scientists may come and study them in their natural and primitive surroundings. Scientists recognize that the study of animals in their natural habitat is infinitely more useful than the study of captives or of dead species in laboratories."
