HOLLAND DETERMINED TO REMAIN NEUTRAL.

THE HAGUE, via London, March 4.—Reports reaching Holland from the United States and other countries indicate that the belief has been spread recently that the Netherlands is about to enter into the hostilities. Semi-official circles here declare that such reports are without foundation. It is asserted that Holland's attitude of complete neutrality has not changed, but that she continues determined to protect her national rights.

Henry Van Byke, American minister, referring to the reports, said: "Naturally the various naval declarations have caused considerable anxiety among the neutral nations, which, like Holland and the United States, have large commercial interests. But I see no signs whatever of any change in the attitude of Holland. She is both peaceful and calm, and as strongly resolved as ever to do all in her power to preserve her neutrality, to maintain her rights."

QUEEN ALEXANDRA THANKS FRENCH NUNS FOR CARE OF SOLDIERS.

LONDON, March 4.—Queen Alexandra has delighted Paris by the following autograph letter to the mother superior of the Franciscan Sisters attending to the wounded in the hospital at Bethune:

"I have learned of your noble and heroic devotion to our brave and unfortunate soldiers. It is with a heart full of gratitude and recognition that I ask you to accept my warmest thanks. I pray the good God may recompense you for the angelic attentions that you have so fully given our unfortunate soldiers, and I shall never forget that it is to you and your sisters that they owe their lives and restored health."

ONTARIO DOCTOR FACES A CHARGE OF MURDER.

NAPANEE, Ont., March 4.—To-day saw the opening of the trial of Dr. C. K. Robinson, who is charged with the murder of Blanche York, whose body was found buried in the cellar of the doctor's home in July last. A large crowd fought for admission to the court-room when the doors were opened. The prisoner showed little evidence of his long detention. He chatted with his wife during the preliminaries of the trial.

A feature of the evidence presented was the testimony of three witnesses to the effect that they saw a hat and raincoat, which they affirmed belonged to the dead girl, hanging in Dr. Robinson's office the night the girl disappeared.

The hearing was adjourned until Wednesday.

WINNIPEG, Man., March 3.—The farmers of northwest Canada are starting seeding this week. The winter had been one of the mildest for many years, and every indication points to an early sowing.

Some 30,000 acres of grain will be sown as a gift to the Canadian patriotic fund. Already 40,000 farmers have signified that they will set aside at least one acre for the fund, and many thousands more will join in the gift of the Canadian farmers.

A huge order for flour is being milled here for exports to South Africa and the West Indies. The stored wheat is about half its usual amount at this time of the year.

There is a big demand for corn in the northwest section and large quantities are coming across the border from the United States, free of duty.


