NEW YORK, Jan. 17 — (AP) — Stocks and assorted specialties continued to make modest headway in today's Stock Market, but many leaders operated over a slightly uneven course.

The Associated Press 60-stock average was unchanged at 50.8, transfers totalled 816,360 shares compared with 934,920 last Friday.

TORONTO, Jan. 17 — (CP) — The gold stocks took another long stride forward today on the Toronto Stock Market, closing 93 higher at a new top for the year or more, while the Base Metals' Stocks posted modest index gains. Western Oils held about even, in the average, with Saturday's final prices.

MONTREAL, Jan. 17 — (CP) — Behind the leadership of newspapers prices advanced in an all-around Stock Exchange and Curb Market, with gains well ahead of losses.

OHIO, Jan. 17 — (AP) — Wheat and rye were down about a cent at times today in a grim market again characterized by heavy demand. Reports of easiness in the cash wheat trade at both Kansas City and Minneapolis, with prices quoted below ceilings on high protein wheat, unsettled the futures market.

WINNIPEG, Jan. 17 — (CP) — Rye trading was erratic today on the Winnipeg Grain Exchange, but for most of the session prices were over Saturday's closing levels. Cash prices: 2 feed 30; 3 feed 49; other grades 51 1/2. Barley: 3 feed 63 1/2; 4 feed 64 1/2.

LONDON, Jan. 17 — (AP) — Strength in home rails featured an otherwise quiet and irregular Stock Market today.

Industrial shares held a fairly steady course against lower levels sought by oils and diamonds. Kaufmann were inactive. International Securities were higher along with British funds.

Consult your dealer regarding your needs: Your dealer has many pressing problems. Let him know how much fuel you will need to last until May 1, in addition to the amount you have in your bin. He can then organize his deliveries so that you will receive your share of fuel as it may become available.

Have your bins ready for the delivery man: He is a busy man these days. Do everything possible to speed up his job. If you are getting both soft and hard coal separately, have the necessary spaces ready and cleared for each.

Clear all approaches to your bins: Be sure that driveway, walk and outside steps are cleared of snow, and sanded if necessary; also clear walk and driveway. Use nearest windows. Keep inside steps cleared and free of boxes, pails, etc.

Accept whatever kind of usable fuel the dealer can supply: Some types of coal are scarce and you can't afford to insist on specific grades or sizes as you would in normal times. Don't take a chance. Any kind of coal is preferable to none.

Take delivery when dealer can make it: Your dealer is working with limited delivery facilities which must be used continuously throughout the winter, if every householder is to receive his share of available supplies. Don't wait, therefore, until you are almost out of fuel before permitting your dealer to replenish your bin. Let him make delivery when he can.
