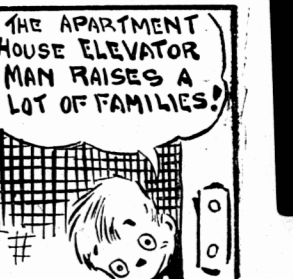

First Anniversary Of Berlin Air Lift Sunday

FRANKFURT, Germany, June 22.—(AP)—The air lift next Sunday will mark the first anniversary of continuous operation to Berlin.

planes assigned to the air lift is lifting a minimum of 8,200 tons daily over the Russian zone from Western Germany.

Of the estimated 1,941,000 tons which will be "airlifted" by Sunday, more than 500,000 tons will be food, 1,200,000 tons of coal and 180,000 tons of other supplies.

Fifty-one British and American planes have been killed in 17 fatal crashes.

On his first day of operation 32 planes were dispatched from Rhein-Main Airport at Frankfurt to Berlin. They carried 80 tons of food, five tons of mail and seven passengers.

On its greatest day—April 16—12,940 tons were ferried in 1,398 flights.

From the start, both air and ground crews were put on a 24-hour day with the pilots flying two or more trips daily.
