TO CONSIDER WAYS AND MEANS.—The adjoining Presbytery Congregations of Caledonia, Murray Harbor South, and Wood Island, revenue over \$1500.00 a year from the Home Mission funds of the church in order to maintain regular services in the congregations and pay the minimum stipend to their pastors. This is felt to be a serious strain on the funds, and in order to relieve, if possible the existing situation, a commission consisting of Rev. J. M. McLeod, Dr. H. W. McEwen, Rev. J. S. McKay, and Rev. J. A. McLellan, to consider the situation, confer with the congregations, and seek to evolve some plan, by re-arrangement of boundaries, and co-operation with the Methodist Church, which also draws on its H. M. funds for the work in this district, whereby adequate services can be given to all parts and the church funds relieved. It is felt to be a serious strain on the funds, and in order to relieve, if possible the existing situation, a commission consisting of Rev. J. M. McLeod, Dr. H. W. McEwen, Rev. J. S. McKay, and Rev. J. A. McLellan, to consider the situation, confer with the congregations, and seek to evolve some plan, by re-arrangement of boundaries, and co-operation with the Methodist Church, which also draws on its H. M. funds for the work in this district, whereby adequate services can be given to all parts and the church funds relieved.
