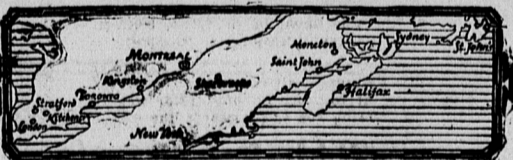

It was voted that the assessment on box holders be \$2.00 for 1928. The old board of directors were re-elected for the year 1928 as follows:
