TORONTO, March 25—(CP)—War conditions, especially in the light of Prime Minister Mackenzie King's announcement in the House of Commons pertaining to the mobilization of manpower, undoubtedly will have an effect on amateur hockey in Canada next year.

Speaking before a meeting of the Ontario Hockey Association executive of which is treasurer, Mr. Dudley said he didn't think the C.O.H.A. could countenance physically fit men doing nothing but playing hockey. Curtailed schedules likely would be in order next season and playdowns also might be affected.

Livestock

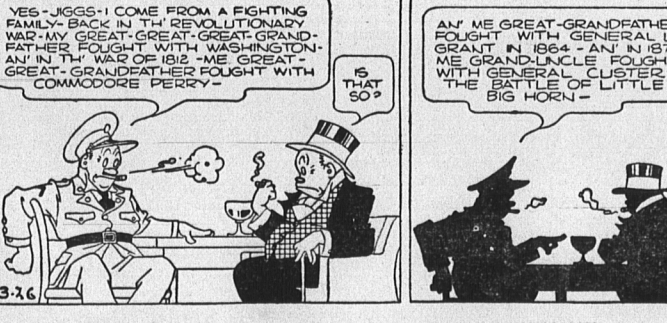

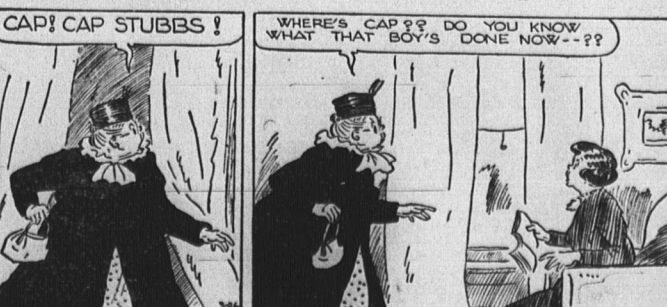
