MONDAY.  
BEING OVERHAULED.—The C. S. Earl Grey is now undergoing a thorough overhauling preparatory to entering the winter service. A number of men from Messrs. Bruce Stewart & Co., Ltd., are cleaning and repairing the machinery.

TO BE ORDAINED.—Mr. Jones, of University of Durham, arrived in Halifax by the Molgouan, and will be ordained to the diaconate in Advent. At present he is acting as lay reader in the missions of Georgetown and Scurry, P. E. Island, says a Halifax exchange.

WORK COMPLETED.—Messrs. Bruce Stewart & Co., Ltd., Charlottetown, have just completed fitting up an up-to-date drying room in the laundry of the P. E. Island Hospital. They have also installed in the Hospital a new up-right steam boiler for sterilizing the water and bandages and running the machines. This firm also shipped two of their famous 4 h.p. Imperial Gasoline motors to Summerside Saturday.

RESIGNS POSITION.—Mr. Arthur Corney, who has for the past twelve years worked in Crocker's business in Charlottetown in the establishment now owned by Block & Co., has resigned that position to accept another in the crockery department of Messrs. R. T. Holman, Ltd., Summerside. Mr. Corney has a thorough knowledge of the crockery business and will be a decided acquisition to the staff of this large and enterprising establishment. He left for Summerside by the afternoon train Saturday afternoon.

ARBITRATION CASE.—The evidence that is being heard by the Court of Arbitrators appointed by the Supreme Court in the case of Walter Low against the Government, which arises out of a claim sixteen or seventeen years old, being in connection with an annex that was built to Falconwood Asylum, is now drawing to a close. The witness that is at present before the arbitrators is an ex-governor of the province and ex-attorney general also, Mr. D. A. McKinnon, who was in office in the latter capacity at the time, in 1900 when a practical settlement of the dispute between Mr. Low and the Government was made by the payment by the Government of certain amounts to the majority of Mr. Low's creditors in respect of the work at the Asylum annex.

FOXES AND OYSTERS.—Among the recent organizations in process of formation in this island, is a company of a character different from most of the corporations at present operating in P. E. Island inasmuch as it is intended to prosecute the breeding of foxes and other fur-bearing animals jointly with the cultivation of oysters. The proposed name of the company for the incorporation of which by letters patent application has been made to the Governor-in-Council, is "Malpeque Bay Silver Foxes and Oysters Limited." The proposed capital of the company is \$95,000, divided into 950 shares of the value of \$100 each. Its office or chief place of business will be at Hamilton, Prince County, P. E. I., and the provisional directors are nominated as follows:—H. Montgomery Jones, manufacturing furrier of New Brunswick; James W. Keir, E. Fanjoy, merchant of New Glasgow, N. S.; J. Ross Miller, physician, of Malpeque, P. E. I.; B. of Amherst, N. S., and Fred J. Lockery, farmer of Hamilton, P. E. I.

LABOUR IN P. E. I.—The Charlottetown correspondent of The Labour Gazette writes as follows, in the October number of that publication, on the labour conditions in this province. "Activity of trade and conditions were somewhat better than for the same period last year. The Fall boom commenced and the wholesale buyers of produce are preparing for a big export trade. The different trades were active, more especially carpenters, machinists, stove fitters and unskilled labour. The Prince Edward Island Railway did the heaviest passenger business for this season during Exhibition week, carrying into this city in two days about 8,000 or more people. Every passenger car fit for service was in use. The rate of wages remains the same, no changes of note being made. Labour in general is quiet as regards strikes, etc. Cost of living, while on a par with more active communities, remains as in the past. The Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen held a meeting in Charlottetown on September 21. The reports showed the Island membership to be almost forty, and the Brotherhood to be in a good condition. The crops were good, considering the lateness of the season. Wheat is reported exceptionally good. The potato crop is also up to the standard of any previous year. The fishing industry was almost at a standstill, very little coming to the local market. Lumber mills in this city were all having a brisk trade. The reports of the fox exchange report that there is an unusually brisk trade in fox shares at present. Stock in old companies is being disposed of at good premiums, and stock in new companies is eagerly sought after."

WET WEATHER DAMAGE.—From its correspondents in different parts of the province The Guardian has received many reports regarding the effect of the recent unprecedented rainy season upon the crops. The reports are, to put it mildly, unfavorable. In the vicinity of Tignish there has been serious loss. Much of the grain was late and practically all that was in stock at the beginning of the rainy weather is still in the fields ungathered and unfit for anything except feed, much of it even unfit for that. Grain that gave promise of excellent field and had been intended for seed is practically valueless. Some farmers have as many as 500 to 700 stalks out yet and little of it will be worth saving either for straw or grain. It is estimated that half the grain crop is seriously damaged.—At Alberton and vicinity an along through the O'Leary district conditions are little if any better. The estimate in this section is 1

per cent destroyed and very much of the remainder badly damaged. In low lying lands conditions are very much worse than this.—Through Wellington and Mont Carmel, where there is considerable low land a like condition prevails, at least 25 per cent of the grain being yet in the fields and growing in the stubble. Stacks of grain, owing to the continued wet and warm weather are covered with a thatch of young growing grain. Through North Bedouque, Freetown, and Lower Bedouque, the damage has not been so great, the crops, for the most part, having been harvested before the wet weather began. There has been considerable loss in Albany and Searletown. A fact no part of the province has been off unscathed and the loss will be between 15 and 25 per cent while a few farmers have lost practically all. The reports so far received cover only part of—King's County. There is, evidently, considerable loss here also, although perhaps less than the other two Counties.

The funeral of the late Mr. John Marshall, Kingston, took place from his residence on Tuesday, Oct. 21st, at 1 o'clock p. m. The day was very stormy, but in spite of the inclemency of the weather many friends from far and near gathered at the home to pay their last tribute of respect to one who was held in high esteem by all who knew him. Interment was in the Presbyterian Cemetery, Clyde River. The late Mr. Marshall was 67 years of age. He formerly lived in Covehead but a number of years ago removed to Kingston. He was a member of the Presbyterian Church and was deeply interested in all that pertained to its welfare. Of a kind and hospitable disposition it was his delight to entertain his friends, and particularly was the hospitality of his home bestowed on the clergymen of his own and other denominations, of whom the Rev. Mr. Orman, Methodist minister of Cornwall, the Rev. A. J. W. Back, of Georgetown, a former pastor, and his pastor, the Rev. J. H. McHattie, were present and took part in the funeral service. 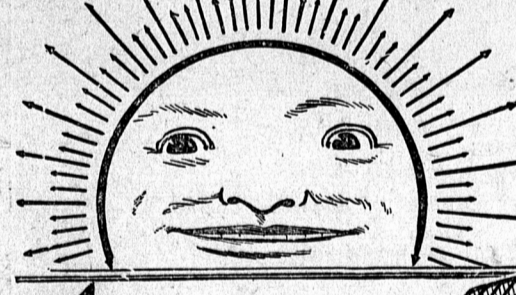
