The steamer sailed from Sydney in June for Havre, France, with a load of steel, and, according to a member of the crew who reached the city yesterday, Captain Allen went ashore in France soon after arrival. REGARDING HOGS

To the Farmers, Gentlemen: We wish to call your attention to our advertisement for hogs, intimat- ing that we will start receiving those Sept. 7th, and suggesting that as many as possible be ready early. This is greatly to your advantage, as there are very few hogs marketed here in early spring, and practically speak- ing none during June, July, August. We are three months without such a thing any stock and it is important that we have goods to supply customers, or else they go to western packers and it is very difficult to secure them again. This was the case last fall when few hogs were sold until Dec- ember—after the customers in Nova Scotia and New Brunswick had bought their supplies elsewhere, necessi- tating our carrying this stock until the spring and summer—at a serious cost of interest, depreciation, etc., as well as losing the trade last fall.

Again, when stocks are light in September, the price is high, and we are generally at the highest, as we can market the product promptly and con- sequently pay you good prices for hogs, which has been the case for years. This is important to you, as well as to ourselves. Another point we want to emphasize is the weight of hogs. For years we have tried to inform you that the market demands meat cut from hogs weighing 120 to 180 lbs dressed weight. We have paid more for those than for any other weight, and we can secure the meats at higher prices. In doing this we have been trying to encourage the "Produc- tion of Quality", or encouraging the man who produces what the market demands. And while there are men who complain of our methods (which by the way is what the Government and Egg Circle people are at consid- erable cost attempting for the egg business), yet we feel that im- provement is being made, and we appreciate the co-operation of those who are making efforts to supply hogs of the desired weight. We will continue to pay an advanced price for all hogs from 120 to 180 lbs. In fact, in the future even more difference will have to be made between the price of light and heavy hogs. In Toronto, according to a recent report of the press, the price of hogs is pay- ing for stags 4c per lb., less than for bacon hogs, sows, which include all heavy 3c per lb. less and heavy bacon hogs over 250 lbs., live (say 180 dressed) 1/2c per lb. less than for select bacon hogs, under 180 lbs. We may say that the price of hogs in the West, which up to two years ago was a very large market for Ontario packers, is now raising very large quantities of hogs of select quality, and after the present demand (as a result of the war) is over there is going to be a very intensive competition in the pork business—in fact there is now—as the large American pack- ers are established in Canada who with their very large business cut- ters so close as to make it most dif- ficult for the smaller packers to con- duct a successful business. This can only be done by your supplying superior quality of hogs, and we on our part curing it in such a manner as to command a price on its own merits. Our interests are mutual. Give us more hogs early in the year, and give us hogs well fed, well finished to dress 120 to 180 lbs.

TALY'S QUEEN IS HAPPY BECAUSE HER COUNTRY HAS ENTERED THE GREAT WAR

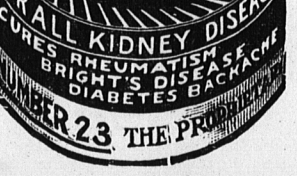

ROME, July 6 (By mail).—The hap- piest woman in all Italy today is Queen Helena. Her wish of ten months long- ing has been answered. Italy has en- tered the field of war. A great change has come upon this beloved Queen of Italy, whose dark eyes were filled with brooding before King Victor Emmanuel announced that his country would take its place be- side the Allies. All thoughts of illness and of sadness which rumor cast upon Queen Helena have been lifted as by a magic spell since the Italian troops marched upon their old time enemy, Austria. At the Villa Ada, Queen Helena, surrounded by her children, does not hesitate to express her joy enthusiastically as a young girl over the final participation of Italy in the war. All of the royal children are making their individual offerings to the war and their prayers for the safety of the King and the triumph of royal arms are intermingled with ac- tive work for the benefit of the patri- a. An incident is told of Queen Hele- ne's patriotic enthusiasm. The Duch- ess of Aosta and her tall handsome son of sixteen, the Duke of Puglie, were calling at the Villa Ada. "Yes, that is what I was thinking," replied the Queen. He is big enough and strong enough and I will ask the King if he may go if you desire it." Queen Helena immediately presented the case to King Victor Em- manuel, who promptly gave his con- sent to the young duke's going to the front. And as a simple soldier the Duke of Puglie took his place—in the Italian army.

At the royal villa and at the Quiri- nal the royal children talk with envy about their sixteen year old cousin who has gone to the front. The Crown Prince has begged his mother to get permission for him to march against the national enemy. The Queen between whom and the royal children there is an intimacy of love and affection has laughed away Prince Humbert's prayers with the permission that he visit daily the sta- tion to give farewell to the departing soldiers. The sight of this handsome little boy, the Prince of Piedmont, waving his middy cap and shouting "Vive l'Italia" is a picture which thousands of soldiers carry away with them. Queen Helena, radiant these days and never looking handsomer, that when she appeared with the royal chil- dren on the balcony before the great demonstration in the Piazza Quiri- nal on the fete day commemorating the adoption of the constitution, does not fail to inspire in her children the sim- ple lessons of "noblesse oblige." The Crown Prince while his youthful spir- its are satisfied by saluting the de- parting soldiers makes his individual sacrifices for the funds toward the families of the soldiers. Princess Jo- cunda, one of the most ardent of contributors and of workers towards the Red Cross, even little Giovanna does her part toward contributions from her own spending money. Princess Yolanda has just presented to the ladies of the Red Cross medals of gold studded with a Red Cross and suspended upon a blue ribbon with the name of Yolanda in gold letters. This fourteen year old princess who on her birthday turned over to the wounded all the exquisite jewels pre- sented to her by her grandmother, the Queen Mother Marguerite, keeping on- ly a bracelet for herself, is personally interested in the military ambulance supply work being carried on in the salons of the Pitti Palace at Florence. With her mother, too, she has visited the different Red Cross ambulance trains as they start to the front. A special tour of inspection was made of the splendid relief train of the Knights of Malta, the young princess asking many questions and jotting the answers down in a tiny note book. All of the royal children are inter- ested in the hospital which Queen Helena has opened in the Royal Palace on the first floor of their own home in the Quirinal. An incident, which has endeared the Queen more than ever to the Italian people happened recently at the Poly- clinic Hospital, Queen Helena, whose self abnegation is a subject of popular eulogy, entered the Polyclinic in her dress to aid the suffering and to study hospital conditions, with the view of bringing practical ideas into her own royal palace hospital. Seek- ing the famous surgeon, Senator Du- rante, she found him at the bedside of a charity patient. The Queen held up her hand in protest when the surgeon turned from the bedside. Rather than have the work interrupted Queen Hele- ne hurried to the doctor's assistance and aided him as he worked over the sufferer.

BRITISH TRIBUTE TO ITALY'S CONDUCT

LONDON, Aug. 2.—The Herald's na- val correspondent writes:— "Although people have been inclined to be a little sceptical toward Mr. Churchill's statement of Dundee that "the submarine menace has been fixed within its definite limits," it is now becoming to be recognized that there were substantial grounds for his opti- mism. The limits admit, it is true, of the "U" boats doing a fair amount of dam- age, and it has been shown that there has been no diminution, but rather an increase, in the depredations since the first lord spoke, yet it is only nec- essary to consider what they might have done, but have not, to obtain an idea of the measures taken against them which must have been in Mr. Churchill's mind. A fractional loss of tonnage of Brit- ain and her allies, and in spite of the fact that the war fleets are active in home waters, ever on the alert for the enemy to come out, the submarine has scored no big success against them beginning with the torpedoing of the regrettable "Cristoforo Colombo" on New Year's morning. The recent loss of the Amalfi, however, shows the risks run when a reconnaissance in force is un- dertaken. What the precise answer to the sub- marine will be in the future it is idle to speculate, but in the meantime the war already has shown that its ac- tivities may be curbed in three direc- tions. The netting of the French boat Curie at the entrance to Pola harbor in De- cember last indicates one method by which the localities used by the boats can be circumscribed. Nets and Their Use. How far nets have been resorted to in the war there has been nothing to divulge. Naturally the powers will not divulge matters of this description, but the combination of net and mine, which seems to offer many possibili- ties of use for defence against under- water craft, has been described in se- veral of the technical papers, and the employment of the Curie, which was forced to come to the surface and then captured, is an example of how it works. If we may draw an inference from negative results, some such scheme as is here indicated must be in use at many of the naval bases. Admiral Sir Percy Scott once declared that with a flotilla of submarines commanded by dashing young officers he would under- take to get through any boom into any harbor and sink or materially dam- age all the ships in that harbor. Not- ing of this kind has yet been accom- plished, which may be held to mean that the nations' success in time and supplemented their boom devices with nets or some other device to make them submarine proof. What may be done at harbors may also be done in narrow waters infested by submarines. This tends more than ever to make the success of the latter mainly matters of chance, at least so far as the attack of war ships is concerned. The track of the war ship is an uncertain one, and all the sub- marine can do is to wait and watch at likely positions. On sighting her prey she must keep below the surface, for above water she is vulnerable to a gun, and this means a reduction of her speed and manoeuvring powers, less- ening the chances of a hit. In short, her main hope is to work by stealth. If, of course, an advance submarine has a more favorable opportunity, as has oc- curred when the Amalfi was hit in the Adriatic and the Pommera in the Bal- tic a few days ago.
