POULTRY MEETING.—A very enthusiastic and well attended poultry meeting was held at Cornwall hall on Saturday evening, the 14th inst. Mr. David Scott, President of the Farmers' Institute, occupied the chair and introduced the speaker of the evening, Mr. T. A. Benson, who gave a lengthy address on the various plagues of the poultry industry. During the past few years greater interest has been taken in this industry, but at the present time more attention should be given to marketing. In P. E. I. the industry represents an annual revenue of about a million dollars. In the Dominion the total revenue from this industry is fifty million dollars; twenty-four million comes from the egg production. In the United States the poultry revenue is about a million dollars. Eleven years ago Canada was exporting eggs. Now they do not export them, but on the contrary they are importing from 14 to 20 million dozen annually, while the prices have gone up year by year. The reason is, that the producers are not keeping pace with the demand. Here in P. E. Island, we have ideal conditions to make the industry a success. We must produce more eggs and a better quality, put on the market in proper condition. Some system which will get this very perishable product to the market as quickly as possible should be adopted. Public consumption in eggs will increase the consumption and there is no danger of over-production. The using of good quality is true economy. Poultry is a valuable asset which gives the quickest returns. Mr. Benson then dealt with the egg circle movement, and explained its details. To make an egg circle a success the members must believe in it, must follow the rules, and regulations strictly, and must co-operate in making it a success. Co-operation is the crying need of our country, a need both to producer and the

consumer. The old system of handling eggs is wrong; it causes a loss in hard cash, to the producer. Eggs should be paid for on a quality basis. In dealing with the new system the speaker gave a number of rules which the egg producer should strictly follow. Feed wholesome food and plenty of water. Use clean utensils for water and food. Keep poultry house clean, sanitary, and free from vermin. Provide clean, dry nests in dark places and gather eggs twice a day. Keep the eggs in a cool, dry place away from Kerosene oil, fish, onions or such "odoriferous" material. Never sell eggs found in stolen nests, etc. On motion of Mr. S. Scott seconded by Mr. C. D. McLean, it was resolved to establish an Egg Circle here. The following directors were elected: Henry Mallet, President; Frank Howard, Vice President; Seymour Scott, Secretary; Treasurer, W. McKinley; Mrs. Geo. McDonald, Mrs. Chas. McLean and Donald Murchison. Auditors—Jas. H. Drake, and Robert McKinley. Delegate to Convention H. Mallett. The meeting closed with a short address by Mr. Brown of Ottawa chief of the Poultry Division. —W.
