WOMEN'S INSTITUTES.—Under the direction of Mrs. Dunbrack the Women's Institutes of this province are doing splendid work, and in some of the mainland papers appears very favourable comment in this regard. The organization is a large, active group, comprising some twenty-nine societies scattered over different districts, with lady members keenly interested in the home and community work which is the general interest of the Institutes. Improvement of schools is one of their larger interests, and they are very successful in raising funds for the painting of the buildings, inside and out, laying hardwood floors, supplying covered drinking fountains, new window shades, papering school-rooms, paying for janitor service, having floors scrubbed regularly, supplying desks and chairs, maps, pumps and flower vases, and stands for plants, fencing the school grounds, and doing wonderful work in brightening and making hygienic and attractive the school premises, which is invaluable in its present effect and future influence on the children. Among the charities liberally patronized by the Institutes are the local orphan asylums. Mrs. Dunbrack has taken special care in the instruction of domestic science and improved household methods, and at present is laying stress on economy in feeding and clothing during the time of national trial. Besides this regular work of the Institutes the members have now taken to helping in patriotic work. They attend to Red Cross work, the Belgian Fund, and the poor at home, and their efforts in these connections are excellent. There is every prospect of a valuable future for these societies.
