Found Guilty

advantage may come from it. It would save time and make for the better administration of justice if more attention were given to the better understanding of the rules of evidence.

The charge against the accused has been framed from Sec. 305.

The onus is on the Crown to prove (a) that the accused supplied or procured a drug for Jessie McBeth, (b) that the drug was noxious, (c) and that the accused had the knowledge that it was intended to be unlawfully used with intent to procure the miscarriage of the woman.

Where the drug is not noxious in itself and quite innocuous and even useful when administered in small quantities yet if the quantity administered is noxious that makes the drug so administered a noxious thing. R vs. Cramp, 5 Q.B.D. 307. In that case oil of juniper was given to a pregnant woman in half oz. doses. It was proved that quantities of this drug considerably less than half an ounce are commonly taken medicinally without any bad effect but that half an ounce produces ill effects and is to a pregnant woman dangerous. The conviction was confirmed.

The offence under this section is complete even if the woman receiving the drug makes no use of it and throws it away, providing it be a noxious thing and is supplied or procured with a knowledge that it is to be used by her to bring about her miscarriage. The supplier or procurer may also be guilty of this crime even where the woman uses the drug to bring about her miscarriage providing it can be proved that the only part he took in the matter was procuring it for her at her or some other person's instigation.

There is ample evidence to justify the finding and I so find that the accused is the father of the unborn child of which the girl Jessie McBeth was pregnant and of which she was subsequently aborted.

There is evidence that this girl had been taking drugs or pills since early in February.

It is an interesting enquiry as to what eventually brought about the miscarriage which it would appear resulted in the girl's death. Here we have the case of a healthy young girl never sick previously apparently able to resist the effect of all the drugs who had taken for the unlawful purpose up to April 30th. When on that day she left the Hospital there is the evidence of Dr. Jenkins that she miscarried at a place of seven or eight miles from the Hospital. It is believed that the miscarriage took place between then and May the second when she arrived at the office of Dr. Oulton at Shediac, and if so that she would be in anything like fit condition to set out alone for the train leaving her residence at a quarter of seven on the morning of May 2nd? Why did she go to Shediac and who accompanied her there? Is it likely that she went alone? The purser of the Car Ferry steamer or some other of her officers or crew could, I am sure, have thrown light on the question. Shediac is a quiet place for any sick girl from this Province to go to. It is off the main line of travel. There is no hospital or regular nurses there. Why was this place sought on May the second when the Moncton Hospital was nearer and situate on the main line of travel? She would scarcely leave her home and friends and the many capable Doctors here to be treated in Shediac for the intervals of blood flowing with which she was afflicted. Her departure was kept concealed from her parents and relatives. If the miscarriage did not eventuate between April the 30th and May 2nd where did it happen and what was used to cause it? It certainly was brought about between April 30th and May 14th when the unfortunate girl arrived at the Moncton Hospital in what must have been a most critical condition. Here is surely a field ripe for the closest scrutiny and the urgent activity of a competent detective.

The evidence does not justify the finding nor do I believe that the miscarriage was accomplished by the drugs she took. The evidence does not tell who performed the miscarriage that caused her death.

It may be well for all those inclined to tamper with the mystery of human life, that "highest gift received from God and nature" to know that when in the attempt to procure abortion or after and in consequence of the abortion being effected the woman dies, the crime is murder under Sec. 259 (d) of the Criminal Code although the accused may not have meant to destroy life—although the dead woman may have sought and consented to the act which terminated in death and although possibly he may very much regret the termination that had taken place contrary to his hopes and expectations.

Mr. Gaudet in his closing address for the defendant seemed to consider it a serious flaw in the case for the prosecution that the evidence failed to disclose the name of the drug given to effect the miscarriage. Is this necessary? The indictment in the case of Reg. vs. Isaacs, 9 Cox C. C. 228, to the form of which no objection was made charged that the accused "supplied a large quantity of a certain noxious thing to the jurors unknown."

Has the charge been proved against the accused? Does the evidence sustain the charge? My duty in seeking for a decision is to look to the evidence and nothing else.

Does the evidence of Hugh S. McLeod and Kenneth McBeth giving an account of certain charges made by each of them against the accused but respecting which he was silent admit of a presumption that the charges were true? The statements made to the party in which no objection was made to his own conduct in consequence of such statements is the sole evidence. The maxim qui tacet consentire videtur must be applied with careful discrimination. To affect one person with the statements of another on the ground of his implied admission of their truth by silent acquiescence it is not enough that they were made to him by parties interested but they must also have been made on an occasion when a

ISOLATES 22 COMPOUNDS

PARIS, Sept. 20.—Roger Barre, Montreal, winner of the Rockefeller Scholarship at the University of Montreal, who is now a student of the faculty of science at the Sorbonne Academie, under Professor Blaine, has succeeded in isolating 22 hitherto unknown new compounds in alpha ketonic acids, or in aniline salts used for dyeing purposes. He will present a paper on the subject in December to the Academy of Science here through M. Behal, noted Academician.


