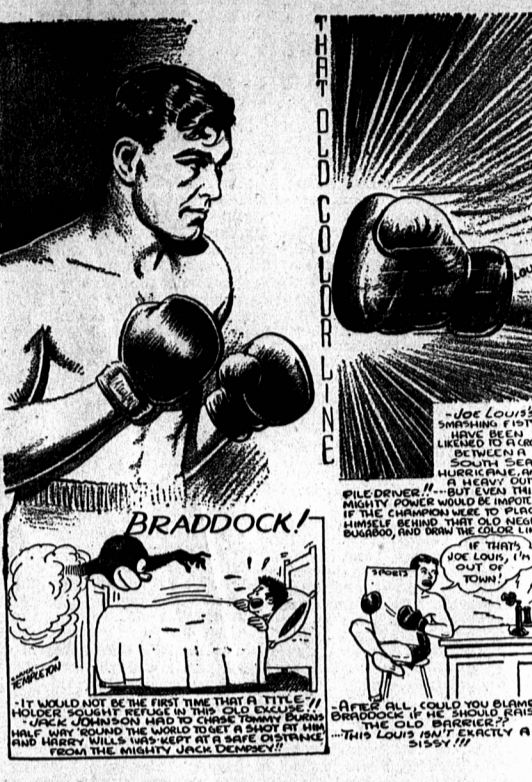

WORLD MARK BROKEN AT TOLEDO

P. by Guardian's Special Wire) TOLEDO, O., July 4.—A world record for the mile pace by four-year-old filly was broken today at the Grand Circuit meeting at Fort Miami track when Calumet Evelyn, owned by McConville Brothers of Ogdensburg, Pa., turned the Oval in 2:00 1/4 in the first heat of the Maumee Free-For-All pace, feature event of the program.

In the second Evelyn cooled down and came in in 2:03 1/2. Third place was split between Miss Abbade and Dick Reynolds, the Miss taking the position in the first heat.

The former record for four-year-old fillies was made at Springfield, Ill., three years ago by Rose Marie Abbe. Her time was 2:02 1/2.

Another bright spot was the finish of the second heat of the second race when Hollywood Phillips came through to pay \$2 ticket holders \$108.80. Place price was \$7.80 and show \$10.40.

The race was a three heat affair with Tara, bay mare driven by Tom Berry, declared winner by taking first and third heats. She was second to the longest in the second heat.

RENEWAL OF TENNIS RIVALRY

Helen Jacobs and Helen Willis Moody To Meet For Wimbledon Singles Title Saturday.

P. by Guardian's Special Wire) WIMBLEDON, England, July 4.—The two Helens of the United States celebrated the National holiday of their country by driving their way into the final round of the Wimbledon ladies singles today, paving the way for the renewal of one of the bitter rivalries of the tennis world.

Miss Jacobs and Helen Willis Moody will meet on Saturday for the final. It will be their first clash since Mrs. Moody defaulted to Miss Jacobs in the third set of the United States Championship finals in 1933.

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Favorites Advance To Semi-finals
