IN MEMORIAM

KATHERINE BOLGER

The sympathy of the entire community is extended to the Bolger family in the loss of their sister Katherine, whose death occurred at Roxbury, Mass., on April 1st.

The deceased had spent the earlier part of her life at Bonshaw on the old homestead, now occupied by her brother Dennis. News of her death came as a shock to all as her many friends were expecting to welcome her home within a month's time.

The late Miss Bolger was a faithful member of the Roman Catholic Church. She was in the seventy-seventh year of her age, and quite active.

Shortly before the time set for her departure for the Island she was taken suddenly ill and passed away within a short time. Her remains were accompanied home by her nephew Mr. Theodore Bolger, Roxbury, Mass.

The funeral which was largely attended took place on April 5 at St. Annes Church, Lot 65, Requiem High Mass being sung by Rev. Leo Herrel, P.P. There in the adjoining cemetery were laid to rest the remains of a dearly beloved sister. She leaves to mourn besides a host of friends three brothers and two sisters. Namely, Dennis on the homestead, John, Green Road and David Alleton, Mass., sister Theodore Notre Dame Academy, Roxbury, Mass. Mrs. Marguerite Sweeney, Charlottetown. MR. ARCHIBALD BEATON

The people of Winsloe and vicinity were very much shocked when on Wednesday, April 1st, word was sent around that Mr. Archibald Beaton, a very highly esteemed resident of Winsloe, had passed peacefully away at the age of 71 years.

The deceased had been in his usual fairly good condition of health until a few days before the coming of the end. Almost without warning his health became much worse and he suffered chiefly from what seemed to have been a slight stroke of paralysis. From this he never fully rallied. All that medical skill and kind attention could do was done but to no avail. He sank gradually until on the above mentioned date his gentle spirit winged its heavenward flight.

Besides a sorrowing widow who was a daughter of the late Donald E. Campbell, Charlottetown, Mr. Beaton leaves to mourn the loss of a kind and loving father, two sons, and one daughter. The sons are Roland

Beaton, at home, and Sutherland Beaton, Toronto, and the daughter is Mrs. Albert Middletown, Winsloe.

Mr. Beaton was the son of Mr. and Mrs. John Beaton, who came from the Isle of Skye quite a number of years ago and settled at Victoria Cross. It was here that the deceased was born. In the family of Mr. and Mrs. John Beaton there were eight members: four sons and four daughters. Of these, only five now remain.

The sons, besides the deceased, are Norman Beaton, St. Eleanor's, Alex Beaton, Edmonton, and Angus Beaton, Winsloe; and the daughters are Mrs. Flora Buchanan and Mrs. Euphemia Hayes, both of Vancouver, B. C.

Two other daughters died when quite young, one at the age of 16 and the other at the age of 18.

Mr. Archibald Beaton was a man who was well and widely known. In his early teens he set out to make his own way in the world. He travelled far and wide. At one time or another in his life he worked in every one of the United States and in every other country north of the Equator. He was one of the pioneers of the Klondyke and went in on the famous trail of "ninety-seven." He spent two years in that great northland.

After he returned from having made good in the Klondyke, he married Miss Mary Campbell, daughter of the late Donald E. Campbell, formerly of Darlington, but later of Charlottetown, and settled at O'Leary. Here he and his family lived until some fourteen years ago when they moved to Winsloe where they have since resided.

Mr. Beaton was a man who took a deep interest in all that pertained to the good of the school, of the church and of the community as a whole. He was a loyal supporter of the Presbyterian Church in Canada and at the time of the disruption in 1925 he stood true to "the faith once delivered to the saints." He was a man of keen intellect and of sane judgment and as a result he was a wise counsellor. He will be much missed in the different spheres of activity, but more especially will his loss be felt in the home. There his loved ones will be lonely without him and will often long for his return.

When the end drew near he remained calm and unmoved. He passed away in the full assurance of that blessed hope of immortality and looked forward with joy to that Home where partings are unknown and where sorrows and trials are forever past.

The funeral, which was a large one, was held on the afternoon of Friday, April 3rd. The service was conducted by Rev. R. Hensley Stavert, assisted by Rev. G. A. Grant, and was a very impressive one.

Interment was in the People's Cemetery, Charlottetown.

The community of Murray Harbor South was shocked in the untimely and sudden death of one of its young women on the evening of April 24th, in the 29th year of her age, after a very brief illness of only a few days, when she answered that call of her Lord and entered into the rest, prepared for those "who love His appearance."

The late Mrs. Jackson, nee May Lorna Clow, was born at Murray Harbor North 29 years ago, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Daniel Clow, where she resided the greater part of her life, until about a year ago, when she was united in marriage to Clifford Jackson of Murray Harbor South. She was a young woman of sterling qualities, highly esteemed, and made a host of friends in the community in which her residence was brief.

The very large number attending her funeral from her former home at Murray Harbor North gave evidence also to the high esteem in which she was held there.

Death came very unexpectedly under sad circumstances, and she closed her eyes to her loved ones and to behold the one of whom she could say "I know in whom I have believed and am persuaded that He is able to keep that which I have committed unto Him against that day."

She leaves to mourn their sad loss and to cherish her memory, besides a sorrowing husband and infant daughter, her mother, one sister and four brothers, Mrs. Lloyd Butler of Murray Harbor North, Cameron, Thomas, Alexander and Charles, all of Murray Harbor North.

Funeral services were conducted at her late home by Rev. C. E. Armstrong, speaking from the words of our Lord "She is not dead but

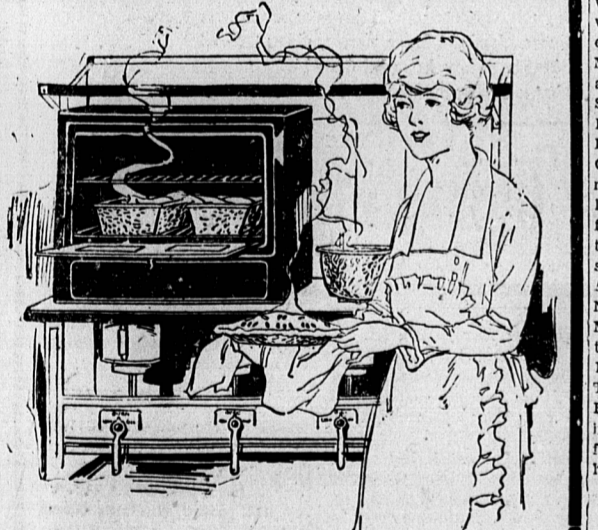
