## 16 YEAR OLD BOY KILLED AT BORDEN

## SHOCKING TRAGEDY AT BORDEN PIER

### Loa Carretti, Dies From Injuries Received Yesterday When a Cable or Hook Snapped From Boom When Lowering Load of Stone Over Pier — Boy Precipitated in Water But is Rescued by Brother.

Another shocking tragedy is added to the already long list chronicled on the island this year. Loa Carretti, sixteen year old son of Mr. G. Carretti, government diver died from injuries received in a terrible accident at Borden Pier yesterday afternoon about 1.30.

A boom supporting a heavy load away about five o'clock in the evening of stone being lowered over the side of the pier snapped when the cable or hook broke, hitting the unfortunate youth and knocking him over the wharf. His older brother, seeing the accident, immediately jumped to the rescue bringing him safely ashore. He was rushing by special train to the Prince County Hospital at Summerside, where it was found he was suffering from a crushed chest and a leg broken in two places, and it is believed a broken back. He passed away about five o'clock in the evening.

- BELGRADE** Jugo-Slavakia, Nov. 9.—The Jugo-Slav parliament today approved a recent agreement by which the Jugo-Slav monopoly passed into the hands of the Swedish Agrarian Trust in return for a \$22,000,000 loan.
- BERLIN**, Nov. 9.—Today, the tenth anniversary of the foundation of the German Republic, newspapers of opposite views speak of that event as the day of Germany's deepest disgrace or as the day which saved Germany from disaster.
- LENINGRAD**, Nov. 9.—The record record for marriage and divorce seems to be 25 minutes. A couple here after taking five minutes for marriage by registration, returned 15 minutes later and got a divorce in five minutes. They explained they could not agree upon where to live.
- MONTREAL**, Nov. 9.—Sale of a seat on the Montreal Stock Exchange has been effected at the new record figure of \$150,000 an increase of \$70,000 over the previous high mark touched in a transaction which took place last January.
- PARIS**, Nov. 9.—Premier Raymond Poincaré took up again today the task of leading France through her post-war problems. Poincaré, called upon by President Gaston Doumergue to resume the premiership which he abandoned when he resigned with his cabinet on Monday, accepted the task.
- NEW YORK**, Nov. 9.—Forced by steadily increasing volume of business to find some new way immediately to facilitate recording of stock quotations, the New York Stock Exchange shortly will put into effect a new system whereby record of the volume of sales will be omitted on all transactions of less than 500 shares, except at the opening.

#### Mr. W. R. Shaw, Livestock Superintendent Interviewed on Return Home.

Mr. W. R. Shaw, Livestock Superintendent, Dept. of Agriculture, returned Thursday night from the Amherst Fall Fair along with boys and girls teams representing Island calf and heifer clubs.

Mr. Shaw was very much impressed with the various exhibits. He said they were of a higher order than usual. Competition was exceedingly keen, with Island exhibitors in all sections winning a large number of the prizes. The Holstein herd of Bunbury Farm was in magnificent show form as was also that of Mr. J. McCarthy, Sussex, N. B. These herds, said Mr. Shaw, contain super Holsteins that will feature prominently in the great Royal Show to be held in Toronto in the near future. The Ayrshire herd of J. A. McRae and Sons was also in very fine condition and dominated in a large number of sections. Edgar Easter was as usual strong in Jerseys, while exhibitors such as the Boswell's, P. Brodie, E. Vessey and others brought many honors to the Island Province in swine and sheep.

It is quite apparent, stated Mr. Shaw, that breeders are reaching a high standard of quality in all classes. The inferior individuals are being eliminated, and a high average of excellence has been established and is being maintained in the herds and flocks now being taken to our Exhibitions.

### Twenty-Eight Are Drowned

(Canadian Press) CAIRO, Egypt, Nov. 9.—Twenty eight persons, nearly all of them girls, were drowned last night when a felucca, or native boat carrying flower feluccas across the river, capsized in midstream near Abu Zabal. A native employee of a nearby wireless station rescued nine girls but was so exhausted that he collapsed and died. The accident was due to overloading the craft.

### DEATH OF HON. J. F. CAHAN

#### Former Member of the Nova Scotia Govt., Passed Away in the Victoria Hospital Thursday Afternoon.

HALIFAX, N. S., Nov. 9.—The Hon. Captain John Flint Cahan formerly Minister without portfolio in the Provincial government, died yesterday afternoon in the Victoria General Hospital where he had been confined the past fortnight suffering from complications of wounds received in the great war. The original injury caused paralysis of both legs.

Mr. Cahan was born at Halifax in 1880. He took an engineering course at Dalhousie University, graduating in 1909. Proceeding to Western Canada, he joined a firm here and made a special study of hydro electrical development. At the outbreak of the World War he enlisted while in the west, serving

### Veniot Favors Investigation

#### Suggestion of Ontario M. P. That Royal Commission Should Be Appointed is Favorably Received.

(Special to The Guardian) OTTAWA, Nov. 9.—Hon. Peter J. Veniot, Postmaster-General, has announced he will favor investigation of his record respecting the treatment of returned soldiers applying for positions in the Post Office Department if any investigation is asked for by organized war veterans. This was his attitude today when his attention was drawn to the suggestion of Hon. George N. Gordon of Peterboro that a royal commission should be appointed to consider the Simcoe postmaster-ship episode.

Mr. Veniot is ready to defend his action in parliament or the court, but it is doubtful if the government will name a royal commission. That was the last thing the government wanted in connection with the customs mess.

Progressive members of parliament offered to support the government when it was clinging to power in 1924 on condition that a royal commission was appointed to probe customs scandals, but the government delayed action as long as it possibly could.

There is no suggestion that affairs in the Post Office Department are in a condition comparable to the state of affairs prevailing in the customs department under a former minister. The only request for an inquiry arises from Mr. Veniot's treatment of the disabled war veteran G. E. Whitaker at Simcoe and other war veterans throughout the country.

It is felt that the necessary inquiry can be held by a committee of the House and falling that, Mr. Veniot may be cross-examined when his estimates are under consideration in parliament. Meantime there are indications that the Postmaster-General has learned a lesson and is now ready to listen to reason.

At all events, he is not riding roughshod over disabled soldiers.

OTTAWA, Nov. 9.—Asked today about the possibility of establishing penny postage to Great Britain Hon. P. J. Veniot, Postmaster-General said there was a division in Dominion government circles toward such a move, but before it could be accomplished there would have to be an arrangement for similar treatment from the British Isles, the letter postage from Britain to Canada being also three cents. This question he added would be dealt with at the next international postal congress, which will be held early in the new year in London, and which he hopes to attend.

### Party Standing In Next Congress

#### DUKE'S SON TO STUDY AMERICAN BANKING METHODS

(Special to The Guardian) LONDON, Nov. 9.—Lord Charles Cavendish, younger son of the Duke of Devonshire, and member of one of Great Britain's leading families, said today that he would leave for New York in January to take a position in the banking house of J. P. Morgan and Co. His purpose is to study American banking methods before returning to England where he will resume his connection with English banking.

### MANU FORMS NEW GOVT.

#### Leader of Peasant Party Given Mandate by the Regency

(Canadian Press) BUCHAREST, Rumania, Nov. 9.—After 50 years of almost uninterrupted rule by powerful capitalists and landed interests, greater Rumania with its Agrarian population of 16,000,000 went today to the hands of a peasant government led by J. Manu.

"It is a triumph of constitutionalism over despotism," declared Manu enthusiastically as he descended the palace steps after the regency had given him the mandate.

"In future our country will be governed by a parliament elected honestly by the people and not by a professional political clique."

Manu's cabinet after Nicholas' fall had failed caused a profound gloom among the Liberals who throughout the day had been in blissful expectation of being summoned by the regency, as the only party capable of solving the crisis which had endured for a week.

Manu's "people's ministry," has had experience in national public office, so that the rural government's accession to power presents a rare experiment in modern democracy and political science.

"We shall establish a real parliament, as opposed to a dictatorial government. We shall cleanse the administration of the cancer of corruption and graft. We shall guarantee every citizen full political liberty and establish complete liberty of the press. We shall discuss stabilization of the currency and negotiate a foreign loan. We shall revise the present obnoxious anti-foreign law passed by Ion Bratianu in 1924 as well as other laws which have made Rumania a most unpopular country abroad. We shall abolish restrictions on foreign capital which henceforth shall have the same opportunities as local capital."

### ARRESTED FOR THEFT

A man from Iris was taken into custody yesterday on a warrant the information for which was laid by a nephew of the accused who lives in the same district.

### Republicans Will Have Clear Majorities in Both Senate and House

WASHINGTON, Nov. 9.—Republicans have established clear majorities in the next Congress in both Senate and House, but have failed to keep full pace with the record-breaking sweep of their party head, Herbert Hoover.

Almost complete returns tonight showed that the new Congress going into office after next March 4, would be divided as follows:

Senate—Republicans, 55; Democrats, 39; Farmer-Labor, 1; and vacant, 1.

House—Republicans 287; Democrats 167; Farmer-Labor 1.

Republicans held all of their 13 Senate seats at issue in this election but captured only seven of the 20 Democratic positions at stake. The Senate is almost evenly divided at present.

In the House election with all 435 seats involved, the Republicans won 27 places now held by Democrats, and replaced the lone Socialist Victor Berger of Wisconsin, and one of the two Farmer-Labor members, William L. Carsh, of Minnesota.

Democrats succeeded in capturing three seats now held by Republicans, one each in Indiana, Rhode Island and West Virginia.

Despite these increased majorities neither branch of Congress will show as large a Republican membership as the Congress elected in the 1920 landslide for Warren G. Harding. Then the Republicans were given a margin of 22 votes in the Senate and of almost 185 in the House.

While Herbert Hoover went into the South and captured North Carolina, Virginia, Florida, Texas and Tennessee, these states yielded only a half dozen seats to Republicans in their almost solid Democratic representation in the House. No Republican Senators were elected in Southern States.
